WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13, 1890.
Mr J S Clarkson, who aspires to be the republican congressional campaign committee what Speaker Reed is to the House of Representatives, has, it is said, had a big row with ex-Congressman Carter, the particular friend of Russell Harrison, and secretary of the congressional committee. Clarkson, as soon as he went to the aid of the committee as the special representative of Messrs Quay, Dudley, et al., of the national committee, began to "boss" things around. He soon gave Representative Belden, chairman of the committee, to understand that his only business for the rest of the campaign would be to raise money and turn it over to him (Clarkson) to be used as he might see fit. This role Mr Belden humbly accepted. Then Clarkson began to show Carter that he only regarded him as his clerk, put there to blindly obey any orders he gave. Carter did not fancy this at all, consequently there has been constant friction between the two men, which finally ended in a war of words, and Mr Carter has gone to Montana leaving "boss" Clarkson in supreme control of the committee.

The delay in getting out the democratic text book has been so great that no attempt will be made to give it general circulation. It contains much valuable data for speakers and editors, and owing to the short time remaining of the campaign, it will hardly reach many outside of those, although the congressional campaign committee will fill all orders for them which may be received from local committees.

Mr Blaine is going to Ohio to speak in McKinley's district, but he goes very much against his will, and only in deference to the enormous pressure which was brought to bear upon him. He is aware of the absurdity of his attempting to convince the intelligent voters of Ohio that his reciprocity idea and Mr McKinley's high protective tariff law mean one and the same thing, when he knows that they are as wide apart both in theory and practice as are the north and south poles.

It is now an open secret here that Mr Harrison will unload commissioner of pensions Raum as soon after the congressional elections as he possibly can, and there is some talk about Raum's getting his back up and resigning before the election, just for spite, as it were.

The Count of Paris and his party have finished the tour of the Virginia battle fields, and returned here for a stay of several days. Since the bad break of the collector at New York, who effectively welcomed the would-be King of France to the United States in the name of the President, every member of the administration has been as much afraid of this representative of defunct French royalty as though he had the small pox. The count proposes calling on Mr Harrison this week, and there is a little ripple of interest to know how he will be received at the White House.

The new tariff law has stamped the treasury department to an unexpected extent, and the complaints have only just begun. Treasury officials hope to escape some of the vexation and the responsibility which properly belongs to them, through the ridiculous order issued last week, stating that the decisions made by the collectors of customs would be final, that is to say, that no matter what an absurd interpretation some ignorant or careless collector may put upon the new law, the importer cannot appeal to the department. He must either accept it or go to the expense of carrying it into the courts. It is claimed by some good lawyers that the entire tariff law is void by reason of the fact that a clause was left out in enrolling the bill for the President's signature. Legal complications as well as wholesale robbery of the people will naturally follow this law.

Justice Miller of the Supreme Court died here yesterday from the effects of a stroke of paralysis with which he was stricken last Friday, and already there is a scramble among the republicans as to who shall succeed him. Attorney General Miller, who is very anxious to be fixed for life before his friend Ben retires from the White House, is, of course, a candidate, but there are lots more of them coming in on every train, so as to be here when Mr Harrison returns to-morrow, and Mr Harrison's law partner may get left again as badly as he did when Justice Brewer went on the bench of the supreme court.

The evil effects of the new tariff law are already being felt by the poor man. Tin-plate has gone up; and when you pay the increased price for tin utensils please remember that it is because of the "protection" given to the English owners of Dakota's undeveloped tin mines by the new tariff law, forced through congress by the republican bosses, that you do so.

The Roseburg Plaindealer makes a long argument to show that, where a mortgage is taken upon real estate which is not worth nearly so much as the mortgage, (as is often the case when the debtor has no more security to give,) the mortgage should not be assessed at any more than the land is worth. Section 2737 Hill's Code provides that "in all cases the assessor shall assess such debt and security for the full amount of such debt, that appears from the record of such security to be owing, unless in the judgment of the assessor the land or real property by which such debt is secured is not worth as many dollars as still appears unpaid of such debt, and then in that case he shall assess such debt and security at whatever sum he thinks to be their real cash value." This we think makes full provision for the suppositious case cited by the Plaindealer.
