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LOCAL RECORD.

SEVEN KANSAS FAMILIES.—A. Wormer, Almer Johns, Robert and John Mitchell, C.A. Woods and J. Jones, with their families, and two other families, two heads of which are on the road with three freight cars of horses, cows and furniture, are in the city for the purpose of locating in this county. There are twenty-seven in all, steady, industrious people. But they get enough of Northwest Kansas, from which country there is a steady exodus on account of the complete failure of crops. As a sample, Mr. Wormer informed a Democrat man that he had forty acres of oats, twenty of wheat and one hundred thirty of corn; but the harvest only produced a few loads of oats and wheat for fodder and all the corn could actually be carried in his arms, in fact was an absolute failure. He sold a span of 1200 pound horses, half Clyde and half Norman, for \$35, a few cows for \$6 and \$7, and most things could not be sold at any price, and hence were brought. They like the appearance of things here and propose locating in this county.

WAS AT SPOKANE FALLS.—Mr. C. G. Burkhardt, immigration agent for Linn county, returned last evening from Spokane Falls, where he had been, accompanied by Mrs. Burkhardt, to attend the exposition. The exposition is a big thing, and is of peculiar interest and worth because it shows up the resources of the country, instead of being an advertising affair for the business houses of the city, as is the case with the Portland exposition to quite an extent. The mineral exhibit is a grand one, and from all over the state are displays of the products of the country. Mr. Burkhardt met Mr. J. D.
