AWAY BACK.—It is a matter of considerable pride to be able to trace one's own ancestry back into the historical past, and to have the family tree to show for it. ALL PAID.—Recently a dispatch appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle that the interest on the O. P. bonds due Oct. 1 had not been paid. BIG OBJECTS.—W. H. Rich, B. F. Jones and Charles Kennedy have joined together in the formation of the Toledo Water Mill and Manufacturing company and filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The object is the building and operating of a water flume and ditch from the Siletz river to the town of Toledo to build and operate saw mills, flour mills and woolen mills, and to build and operate railroads; to buy and sell real estate, etc. The capital stock is fixed at \$150,000, divided into shares of \$1 each. Toledo is the place for the principal office.—Times.

WILLAMETTE valley farmers are by no means wallowing in luxury. While there has been a fair yield there, this season, their chief product, wheat, was not a large crop, and the prices they received for it were low; the fruit crop was also light, which cuts into their annual incomes. We talk of hard times in eastern Oregon, but those who have visited the farming districts in the western part of the state, say the farmers over there would consider themselves rich if they had as much ready cash as the farmers here have.—Ochoco Review.

Oh, please don't. The fact is there is more ready cash in circulation, at least, in Albany, than for many years. Better payments are made and less credits are being given. The wheat crop was good and the price paid up to the average for several years. The sale of dried and other fruits has been larger than usual, with big prices, and hops have been in immense. The Prineville papers seem to have a spite at the valley. Here we rejoice at Crook county's ready cash prosperity; but do not envy her at all.

THE YELLOW STUFF.—\$35,793.82 per ton! That is the astonishing figure of a bottle of quartz gold at Strong's livery. The sample assayed is from the Red Bull mines in the Quartzville district. Another bottle contains very rare specimens of crystallized and wire gold, about \$20 worth. A small rock this covered with spun and woven wires of gold is valued at \$25 as a specimen. Mr. Martin Blyeu brought in a \$100 pan of specimens this morning from the Blyeu and Strong mines. It is a rich find and no prospecting has yet yielded such displays of the precious metal. A Salt Lake firm has made some locations near this mine and will work it on a large scale next spring. Interest in gold mining property increases. The Albany mills in the Quartzville district started up Monday. Their run will be a surprise, surpassing any yield of gold yet found.—Salem Journal.

MIXING CLAIMS.—Harry Massey has sold to C. Marsh and W. E. Peck, his one-fourth interest in the Red Bull mines in the Santiam district, representing that there is 200 feet of tunnel, 140 feet of cross tunnel and a 24 foot shaft. Consideration, \$3000, provided it is as represented.
