

A WINTER'S OUTFIT.

The increase of prices under the new tariff law chiefly concerns the consumers. The winter is near and many people are beginning to buy their supplies of warm clothing, the cost of which is always an important question with persons moderate of means. The new tariff law will add very greatly to the hardships of the coming season, for it must increase the price of nearly everything that goes to the making up of a winter's wardrobe.

It will be necessary for the dealers, for example, to charge about \$19.50 for a woman's ulster that last year cost \$15; \$12.50 for what was then a \$10 suit of clothes. The material for an all wool dress costs at least \$2 more than it did a year ago. A waterproof that could be had last summer for \$6 will cost in the neighborhood of \$8.

The following table shows, with a very close approach to accuracy, how much the new tariff will add to the cost of certain important articles of the winter's outfit. The family assumed consists of a man, his wife and a boy. The articles enumerated are comparatively cheap but of decent quality. The woman is given a cotton and a woolen house dress and a good woolen dress for best wear. The man and the boy are each given two suits of clothes.

The addition of \$30 to the year's expenditures means with a majority of men dependent upon their labor the difference between a savings bank account and debt. And this \$30 does not begin to include all the extra burden which the new law puts upon the consumer, although it about expresses the ratio of the increased cost of living.

It may be taken for granted that the man who receives an annual salary of \$1,200, of which he last year spent \$1,000, must this year go without some articles that he and his family have enjoyed or else get into debt, for it will require about \$1,300 to buy what could have been purchased last year for \$1,000.—New York Herald.

A DESERVED TRIBUTE.

Some time ago Gov. Hill appointed Roger A. Pryor, an ex-confederate, to a vacant judgeship in New York. John Russell Young, an old-time friend of the newly-made judge, gave a dinner in honor of the appointment, at which a unique number of leading lights of the country was gathered. Ex-President Cleveland, Chauncey M. Depew, Daniel Dougherty, Gen. Sherman, Dan Lamont, A. K. McClure and others were present. After dinner speeches were marked features of the occasion. Mr. Depew one of the greatest orators of the day, and often spoken of as a republican candidate for president paid the following just tribute to the sincerity and worth of Ex-President Cleveland: "But if I am to name the typical American, the man who loves and believes in his country beyond everything else, the man who, determining once in what direction his duty leads, cannot be swayed from the path, the man who is doggedly persistent in what he believes to be right, the man who thinks not of self, but of his country and its needs, I would name Grover Cleveland. What he has accomplished is the very highest tribute to the possibilities of American citizenship. A country lawyer in the city of Buffalo, he shed lustre upon the high profession which he had chosen. As the Mayor of his native city he presented as his record a clean and economical administration. Coming into the highest position in the land without previous experience and with scarcely a precedent to guide him in the conditions which surrounded him, he won the affection of his party and commanded the respect and admiration of his opponents. I find myself in one of the proudest positions of my life in being permitted to present to you Grover Cleveland as the typical American."

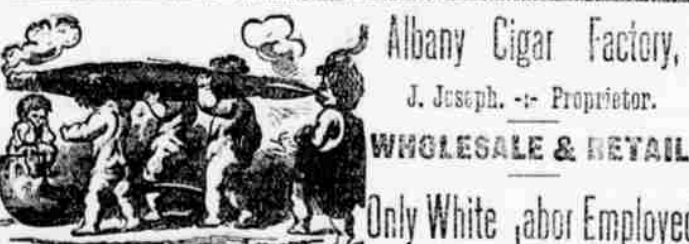

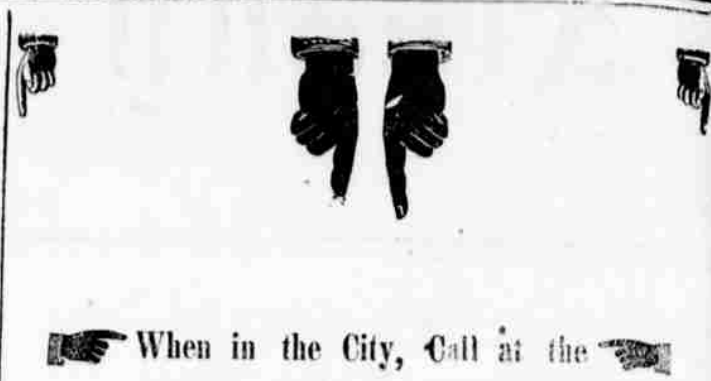

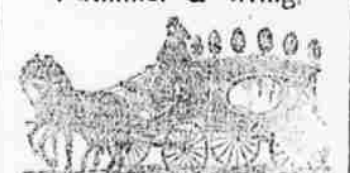
