LOCAL RECORD.

HORSE SENSE.—It is natural for neighboring towns to pick at each other as it is for school boys to fight. That is the way the town of Albany is made up. It is Chicago vs. St. Louis; St. Paul vs. Minneapolis; Tacoma vs. Seattle; Salem vs. Albany; and Gervais vs. Woodburn. The Gervais Star gives the Gervais standpoint: "Wednesday afternoon a fine span of horses came on a dead run into town, with the front wheels of a wagon. They were caught and blanketed and carried to their owner, who proved to be Mr. F. Hays, of the country east of Woodburn, came and took charge of them. Mr. Hays had driven them to Woodburn, where he intended to do some trading, but the horses having a proper regard for their owner's interests, stuck out at a great rate of speed and never stopped until they reached Gervais, the commercial center of the Great French Prairie, where they knew he could buy goods at prices that merchants of neighboring towns do not pretend to compete with."

WESTERN OREGON HOPS.—The Willamette valley will turn out 20,000 bales this year, against 30,000 raised in Washington, and when the people of the Willamette do go into the hop business, they will astonish the natives, says an Ex. There are fifty-six men in the vicinity of Aurora and Butteville who belong to the hop growers association. About 2000 bales are raised around Silverton, 2000 about Brownsville, 5000 about Eugene, 3000 about Salem, 1000 about Independence, and 6000 about Aurora and Butteville.

The number of trains running into Roseburg now is considerably over a hundred. The new appointment, also, raises the grade of this station, and makes it the most important in the state outside of Portland. The only other station outside of that city having a similar official is Ashland.—Roseburg Review.

The number of trainmen running into Roseburg, the DEMOCRAT is informed, is about fifty instead of a hundred, and the little act of appropriating a train master does not make Roseburg to the most important in the state outside of Portland. The business of the Albany office is approximately three times that of Roseburg. Likewise Salem and Eugene is considerably larger. As a matter of fact Albany is the most important station in the state outside of Portland, the number of railroads running into it easily making it such, as well as the immense business of the point. Roseburg never had eight trains stopping there at one time. Albany has, and every noon the number is from five to eight, and it is the terminus of five regular trains.

MISFITS.

A farmer has been heard from who did not bite at a fraud. He was going to his hotel at Salem late at night when a man rushed up and said some one had fallen off the bridge and needed help. The farmer said he was too sleepy to go, suspecting something wrong. The man wanted to get him in an obscure place in order to rob him undoubtedly.

The bridge across the Columbia at Vancouver will be 6000 feet long and will cost about \$1,000,000.

The population of Washington and Idaho under the recent census was about 410,000. In order to show that all the bungling is not done by Pacific Coast papers we publish the following from the N. Y. World, the greatest paper in the world: "The Twelfth Ward of this city has a population of 256,859. The two new states of Idaho and Washington have together a population of 140,000."

Papers that are publishing a statement that county sheriffs in this state get \$20 a week for boarding four prisoners and \$15 a week for boarding five prisoners, according to a state statute, are mistaken. The law contemplates that the sheriff shall receive \$5 each per week for the board of four prisoners, and \$3 for all above that number.
