LOCAL RECORD.

THE CRABTREES AND BLYENS.—Mr. Wm. O'Meara, in writing an article to the Salem Journal, without any warning, ran off on to Linn county in the following manner:
"The machinery [at the penitentiary] is driven by a large turbine wheel run by an ample supply of water force led through the grounds in the deep broad ditch, led from the Santiam. Here I recall the 'Canada' of the classic region of Scio and the Forks, and think of the Crabtrees and the Blyens, and the old timers of the neighborhood who were wont to give to me of what it meant when Greek met Greek, and where no Homer ever nodded without cause to soon learn that there was something the matter with his head. 'Scio,' much renowned for Democracy and its belongings."

KEENE'S SUCCESS.—A large and remarkably appreciative audience gathered at the Opera House Saturday evening to witness the rendition of Richard III by Thos W Keene and company. It proved to be the greatest theatrical treat ever given in Albany. Keene is a master at tragedy and a marvel as Richard III, the most consummate villain in history. His support was remarkably good generally, particularly in Mr Frank Henning's Henry VI, George Loxock as Richmond and Eugene Moore as Buckingham. The closing scene in which Richmond and Richard III fought to the death of the latter was masterly performed, and was pronounced the best fight ever seen here. Keene's fierce and realistic, calling forth loud applause, to which Keene responded. Loxock should also have presented himself.

A LONG TIME COMING.—A postal card addressed to Gen Mart V Brown and mailed sometime in the seventies, so long ago that date cannot be exactly traced, has at last reached the DEMOCRAT office. SCIO ITEMS.—The first shipment of paint from the Oregon Metallic Paint Works, of this city, was made Thursday to Wm. Herron, of Salem, and Stewart & Sox, of Albany.

Our paint mills are now turning out an excellent quality of metallic paint. The bank of Scio is being decorated with a coat of it.

Mart Blyeu, of this city, has a yard a short distance above town, from which he gathered between 15,000 and 16,000 pounds of first-class hops. Wednesday he sold the crop to W. Herron, of Salem, for 35 cents per pound, amounting to something over \$5000, or a net profit of near \$300 per acre. Who can beat it.

Mr. Morehead, who has charge of the Beaver Creek Coal Mining Co's mines, brought down from their mines several hundred pounds of fine coal Wednesday, leaving it at the Metallic Paint Co's works in this city. It was here used for fuel, though the engine is a wood burner and not well adapted to burning coal, they kept up steam without difficulty, with all the machinery in motion.—Press.

CLARA MORRIS' ENGAGEMENT.—The Boston Globe thus speaks of Clara Morris, who opens her engagement at the Albany Opera House Friday night: "The appearance of Miss Clara Morris in her new play, 'Renee de Moray,' drew a large and brilliant audience to the Globe theatre last evening that crowded the house from orchestra to the gods' gallery. It was a critical and appreciative audience, drawn by one of the few great actresses this age has produced. When the perspective of time shall have made possible accurate estimates of those who are in and of the life today, there can be little doubt that Clara Morris will be accounted the greatest histrionic genius among actresses that America has ever produced. In Forrest, the elder Booth, Davenport, in Edwin Booth, McCullough, Lawrence Barrett, and others that might be named, the list of actors is notable; in actresses few have reached greatness, and of these, in native histrionic genius, that asks nothing of the decorative properties, Clara Morris must be conceded to stand alone. If she were to play on a bare platform, devoid of stage accessories and costumes, she would make her hearers forget everything, save her intense, magnetic, dramatic realism."
