THE OREGON PACIFIC

In the Hands of a Receiver.

The Oregon Pacific Railroad Company and the Willamette Valley & Coast Railroad Company, were yesterday placed in the hands of a Receiver, on the petition of the Farmers Loan & Trust Co., of New York, representing the bondholders.

T. E. Hogg, President of both companies, was appointed Receiver.

The order was made by Judge Pipes, of the 2nd Judicial District, on the application of Mr. D. McClure, of the firm of Turner, McClure & Rolston, of New York, the counsel for the Farmers Loan & Trust Co.

The Receiver has duly qualified and is in possession of the property of the railroad companies.

It is expected that the employees of the road will be continued for the present under the Receiver, in their respective duties.

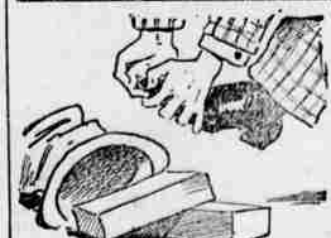
