LOCAL RECORD.

A YOUNG MAN'S DISAPPEARANCE.—Mr. Eugene Fisher, a son of E. T. Fisher, county surveyor, and brother of Ralph Fisher, of this city, left Albany on Sept. 13th, on a trip through the east, in order to see something of the United States, having spent ten or twelve years in hard labor on his father's farm. He wrote home almost daily until after the 20th of September, when a letter was received from him, dated at Buffalo, N. Y., in which he stated that he would go from that city to New York, and mapped out the remainder of his trip from that city home. He had been at Niagara Falls, and sent home a picture of himself with the falls in the background. At Buffalo he cashed a check for \$250, which was returned by the First National bank of this city to the clearing house of New York. Nothing has been heard of him since the 20th of September, and as he was to be home by the 15th of October, it is feared there has been foul play, some one learning of his possessing money and taking advantage of it. He was very prompt about writing, was steady and upright, and, being thirty years of age, well able to take care of himself. The matter has been placed before the chiefs of police of Buffalo and New York.

Our people should treat them well, not as a business speculation, but because they have been treated badly long enough, and deserve a kindly pat after years of crop failures and cyclones.

INSURANCE RATES.

Previous to the fire at the corner of First and Washington streets, about nine years ago, the insurance rates in Albany were placed under what is known as No. 2 book, being on an equal with Portland. Then they were changed to No. 3 book, increasing the rate from 60 to 75 cents, and proportionately on all risks.

Since then the losses by fire have been only nominal, making the increased rate an injustice to our citizens. A petition was circulated today for the changing of the rate to book No. 2, and generally signed. It sets forth the situation in concise language, and we give it in order to show completely how Albany stands on the subject. The change will save to the city several thousand dollars yearly, and the Pacific Union, if it regards justice, will grant the petition.

To the Pacific Insurance Union: We, the undersigned insurance agents for the several fire insurance companies represented in the State of Oregon, city officers, property owners and citizens of Albany, Oregon, would beg leave to represent:

That the city of Albany is as well protected from loss by fire as any town in the state, having an abundant water supply furnished by the Santiam water canal and ditch, and cisterns, well and favorably distributed throughout the city, one of the best water works in the state, fed and supported by two very large and newly improved pumps, three well drilled and well equipped fire companies, two excellent steam fire engines of latest pattern, a hook and ladder company, and a most efficient fire department. Laws very strict in regard to extension of the fire limits. Our facilities for extinguishing fire being superior to those of Portland and Salem, both of which are rated under book No. 2, while Albany is rated under book No. 3; that there is in contemplation by the city authorities a provision by municipal regulation for the putting of horses on our steam fire engines, that during the last eight years our efficient fire department has shown itself able to cope with any and all fires that have occurred, and that the losses during that time to insurance companies doing business here have been only nominal. In view of these facts we petition the Board to make an order rating the city of Albany under rate book No. 2 instead of rate book No. 3.

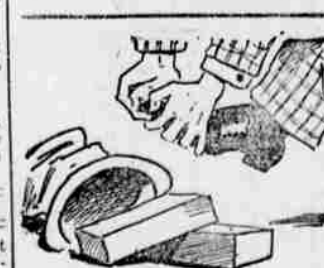
