WASHINGTON, Oct. 27, 1890.

Attorney General Miller has experienced a change of heart since U. S. Treasurer Huston wrote sneeringly of him that he took no interest in "practical politics," or else he was acting under the direct orders of his superior officer, Mr. Benjamin Harrison, who is an adept in the peculiar shade of "practical politics" that has given the Indiana republicans their great "blocks of five" reputation, when he revoked an order issued by Attorney General Garland prohibiting the employment of deputy U. S. Marshals to act in connection with elections for a longer period than five days. Mr. Garland issued the order to prevent the notorious John J. Davenport from corrupting the U. S. Treasury by hiring for weeks before the elections in New York thousands of deputy marshals at \$5 a day, whose only business was to work for the republican party, and for the present Attorney General to revoke that order at this time is as arrant a bit of partisanship as was ever exhibited by a member of any administration.

Under the law these deputy marshals can only be employed in towns of more than 20,000 inhabitants and it is now certain that swarms of them are to be employed in every town above that population in the country, in fact they have been employed and under pay at the rate of \$5 a day for some days past, and everyone of these men are republican workers, mostly of the sort that have no scruples when a political advantage can be gained. It will now be in order for Messrs Quay, Dudley, Huston & Co. to take the Attorney General to their hearts, and—here's the milk in the cocoanut—induce the republicans of Indiana to withdraw their opposition to his being nominated by Mr. Harrison as successor to the late Justice Miller. Ye gods! how this little Miller will rattle around in the chair of the dead Miller.

Ex-President Cleveland has been here several days in attendance upon the Supreme Court where a case in which he is counsel is being heard. He is receiving a great deal of attention, and if he would accept invitations he would be made a social lion of, but he says this is strictly a business trip, and that he will come again and bring Mrs. Cleveland, whom all Washington loves, with him.

The question of the validity of the new tariff law having been raised by the New York importers, and such able lawyers as Senators Carlisle and McPherson having expressed the opinion that the omission of the paragraph reducing the taxation on tobacco from the copy of the bill signed by Mr. Harrison made the entire law void, it has greatly disturbed the administration. Mr. Harrison was aware of this error soon after congress adjourned and to have it corrected was one of the reasons he was so anxious to have an extra session. How the Supreme Court would decide this question, should the importers determine to carry it into the courts, is, of course, problematical, but the chances are that the republicans on the bench would take the same view of it that prominent members of their party have already expressed—that the omission of a clause in the bill only effect the clause so omitted. Representative Bayne, one of the republican conferees, made a bad break in his effort to explain the omission by saying that it was intentional on the part of the conferees. Senator Carlisle also one of the conferees proves the contrary to have been the case.

Civil Service Commissioner Roosevelt can be a very, very funny fellow when he tries. He has issued a manifesto which deserves a high place in the humorous literature of the day. With the agents of the various republican state associations bulldozing and threatening to black-list the government employees if they do not contribute, right under his nose, Mr. Roosevelt writes to the presidents of these associations warning them that members of their associations in the government service will be prosecuted if they violate the law. Could anything be more farcical?

If the best information obtainable here is correct I don't see how the democrats can fail to carry the house. The congressional committee figures on not losing more than four districts it has in the present house, and on making the following gains: Two in New York, two in North Carolina, one in South Carolina, one in Louisiana, one in Alabama, two in Connecticut, two in Maryland, two in Virginia, two in Arkansas, seven in Ohio, two in Iowa, two in Michigan, two in Wisconsin and one in Kansas, a net gain of twenty-five. Besides these there are twenty-two other districts which the committee mark as doubtful, but think their chances of carrying are good. A net gain of ten members would give the democrats the house by one majority.

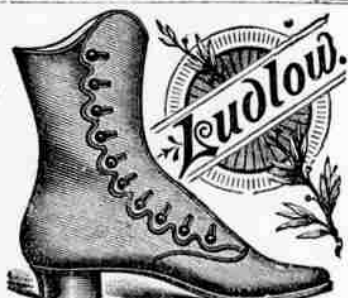
