The voters were all present and voting throughout the country yesterday, hence a quorum, and democratic victory.

The next speaker of congress will be a gentleman, a scholar, one willing to protect the rights of all. He will not be an autocrat.

The democratic campaign of education is more potent in the election than all the "fat" Quay, Dudley, Clarkson & Co. could gather together.

On Tuesday the bone and sinew of the country gathered from far near and to pass judgment upon the doings of republican leaders in the late congress. A quorum being present and voting, a decisive verdict was rendered against the protection scheme of McKinley and others.

Blaine declared in a speech at Philadelphia last Saturday that the McKinley tariff was the great leading issue of the campaign. Well, the great jury of the country, the voter, after hearing all the evidence and arguments pro and con, have deliberately returned a verdict for the plaintiff, the people, and against the robber tariff.

To the Legislative Assembly of the state of Oregon:

We, your petitioners, ask that the Trespass law for our state be so amended as to permit any person to pursue and kill without being subject to damage, under law, wherever they may be found in a wild state, the following named animals: Bear, cougar, wolf, wildcat and lynx.

This would give a man pursuing any of the above animals liberty to enter the premises of another, and trample down an acre of grain, or carelessly shoot a horse without being liable for any damage.

AN AGRICULTURAL HINT FROM GLADSTONE.

A few years ago, Mr Gladstone, speaking to the farmers in a Scotch district where agriculture was greatly depressed, asked them why they did not try the production of jam for the city markets. He pointed out that the small fruits from which this luxury could be compounded would grow well in their soil, and that for such goods there was always a good market. The Tory editors laughed at Gladstone's kitchen economy, but the Scotch farmer took the matter seriously and have found their profit in it. A large and productive industry has sprung from the old statesman's suggestions. It is along some such lines as these that the farmers will most surely draw to themselves a larger share of the surplus wealth of the country. That surplus is abundant, but all sorts of people with keen wits and strenuous energies are competing for it. Those who have it are ready to exchange it for gratification of various sorts. The problem is to please them. Within the bounds of innocent and wholesome delectation there is a wide range for the exercise of invention by the food-producers of the nation. If they confine themselves to the business of raising corn and wheat, and pork and beef, their market will be narrow; they can widen it, almost indefinitely, if they will devote to their business the same kind of ingenuity that manufacturers of all classes are constantly exercising in their efforts to attract to their own coffers the abundance of the land.—*Washington Gladden, in the November Forum.*

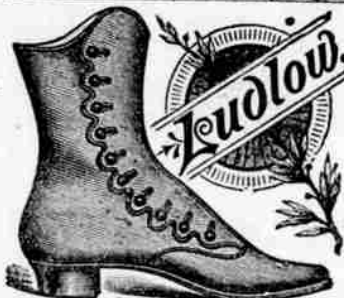

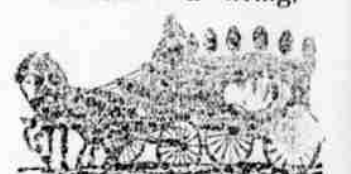
