MORE RAILROAD TALK.

—Railroad talk is cheap now. We were given the following last week as coming from headquarters. When the work in Cow Creek canyon is completed the force of men here will be put to work extending the east side road to Junction, right of way of it being already secured. Then two other lines will be put on between Portland and San Francisco, one to run down on the east side road and the other on the west side. What is now the Roseburg express will be made an overland train, and the present Albany express will run to Eugene.—Eugene Register.

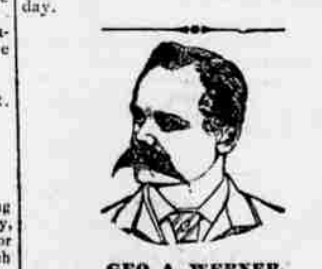
