The latest advice make the democratic majority in the next house about 119. This is less than they had after the election of 1874, which did not work a political revolution—Oregonian.

Truth pleads in vain for recognition in the columns of the Oregonian under circumstances like the present. The democrats had a majority of about 75 in 1874 and it worked a remarkable revolution—the election of Samuel J. Tilden in 1876, though republican leaders cheated him out of the office.

Gov. D. B. Hill as a United States Senator from New York, to succeed the slow-going Everts, the sprightly tariff reform democrat, Gen. Palmer of Illinois, to take the place of Farwell, W. F. Vilas, or some other friend of the people from Wisconsin to succeed Spooner, Maj. McKinney or Mr. Jones of New Hampshire to take the place of Grand mother Blair, and a round reform farmer's alliance man to take the place of Ingalls of Kansas and Moody of South Dakota would be adding an amount of ability and respectability to the senate that rarely happens at one time.

A decision of some interest, construing the law prohibiting the mailing of envelopes having on the outside words calculated to reflect injury on the character of anyone, was rendered by Judge Wheeler of the United States District Court for the district of Vermont, recently. The court held that the act was violated by sending through the mails letters contained in envelopes bearing the words "Excelsior Collection Agency" printed in large letters across the upper half of the envelope. The printed words were separate from the direction to return if not called for, in the lower left hand corner, and the court held that they were obviously placed so as to attract attention and reflect delinquency in making payment upon the persons to whom the envelopes were sent.

EX-PRESIDENT CLEVELAND'S VIEWS.

To an Associated Press reporter, on the results of the election, ex-President Cleveland said:

I am delighted, and challenge the right of any man in the country to rejoice more heartily than I over the results of yesterday. My gratification is that of an American, proud of my fellow countrymen, who, though led away for a time by party prejudices and blind confidence in cunning and selfish leaders, could not be deluded to their ruin.

They have demonstrated that in dealing with them it is not safe to calculate that they are stupid or heedless of the welfare of their country. The necessity of tariff reform, with its consequent reduction in the cost of living, and the duty of the democratic party to advocate it, has been fully demonstrated by the action of the people yesterday. Their decision has been deliberately made and it is all the more significant because they have voted upon their reason and judgment, because they have proved protection powerless as against their convictions. Of course there is nothing for the democratic party to do but to push on the battle at all times and all places on the line which they have laid down—that is to insist upon the wise adjustment of the tariff taxation to the reasonable needs of the government, as opposed to the plan which has enriched the favored classes at the expense of the masses of our people. Until the victory is won, the question of tariff reform will not be settled, and the pledges and professions of the democratic party to the people redeemed.

Our party has made an honest, earnest fight. It has planted itself upon its disinterested and unselfish devotion to the interest of the people. Its absolute unity and harmony on the question of tariff reform shows its quick recognition of true democratic principles and its enthusiasm in the cause which involves the people's welfare. Everywhere our people have done magnificently, and the harvest they have gathered has been nobly earned.

In answer to an inquiry as to his views on the operation of the ballot reform law, Mr. Cleveland said:

I think there should be no more opposition to the principle of ballot reform. The evidence of its usefulness and benefit to the people I regard conclusive everywhere. Every honest man should congratulate himself that we have a law that protects our voters from corruption and intimidation, when once adopted it will not be surrendered.
