

NO REMEDY FOR WRINKLES.

It is common to speak as if any care of the skin beyond personal cleanliness was foolish and a sinful waste of time. This is but a remnant of the old idea, which rigid Puritans held in common with Catholic ascetics, that it was inductive to a saintly frame of mind to make the dress as hideous as possible, and show one's contempt for natural beauty which God has lavished all over the face of the earth. A soft, beautiful complexion is certainly an attraction which every woman should desire, and any simple means, which does not occupy time needed for more important matters, should be tried to attain such an end. There are many complexion which chafe readily, and tan in the spring winds. A simple preparation of sweet cream rubbed into the skin, after washing it thoroughly, is a remedy for this trouble. This should be applied at night, just before retiring, and the next morning the face should be washed thoroughly, first in lukewarm water, and afterwards in cold, to give tone to the muscles. Some ladies who do not find glycerine irritating to the skin use in the same way a small portion of it diluted with half its bulk of rose water. This preparation is rubbed in the face and hands, and gloves are worn at night. A little ammonia in the water is a help toward keeping the skin firm and free from wrinkles. There certainly is no remedy for wrinkles after they come. It should be remembered, however, that an amiable temper, a clear conscience, and freedom from a disposition to worry over the petty annoyances of life, are qualities of mind and heart that will keep the face free from wrinkles and beautiful to the ripest old age. A habit common with studious children, and those who are near-sighted, is to knit the brow. This often causes premature lengthwise lines in the forehead.

A CHINESE RAILWAY.

There is now in operation in China between eighty and ninety miles of railroad, lying between the Kai-Ping collieries and Tien Tsin, the nearest port to Peking. This line was commenced in 1881, to carry coal from the mines for a distance of seven miles to the head of a canal, which for topographical reasons, could not be brought nearer. Permission to build it had been asked the authorities in vain several years before, and was only finally secured by the declaration of the directors of the company that they must stop mining unless they obtained this means of transportation. Then leave was granted for the construction of a tramway, on the condition that only horses or mules should be used as motive power. It was a call of taking an ell where an inch had been given, and the English engineers went quietly to work to construct a locomotive out of such bits of iron and steel as they could gather. They succeeded in making a machine that would run, but had no sooner done so than they were prevented from putting on the finishing strokes. The tracks in the yard in which it was built were torn up, and it was thrust into a shed, either for final retirement or to wait for better days. A few months afterward its completion was ventured upon, and the government kindly withdrawing its scrutiny, the operation of the little road by steam began without official sanction.

The principal objection of the government to railroad enterprises, while admitting their usefulness, was that they would probably have to be managed by foreigners, who would thus obtain further influence in China. Experiments in a small way were subsequently made, showing that this could be avoided. Under a board of Chinese directors, twenty-three miles were added to the Kai-Ping road, and afterward another section of sixty miles, bringing the line to Tien-Tsin. This road is in the northeastern corner of the kingdom, in an out-of-the-way nook, where the population is sparse, and popular prejudices have least to be contended with. Its importance to the further prosecution of the railroad system, however, is great, since it not only demonstrates that the natives can control their own roads, provided that they can pay for them, but it can furnish the necessary supplies of coal for the operation of other railways in the region of Peking and Tien-Tsin. Though coal abounds in nearly every province of China, the mine at Kai-Ping is (or was two years ago) the only one in the empire.

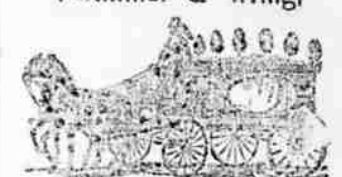
