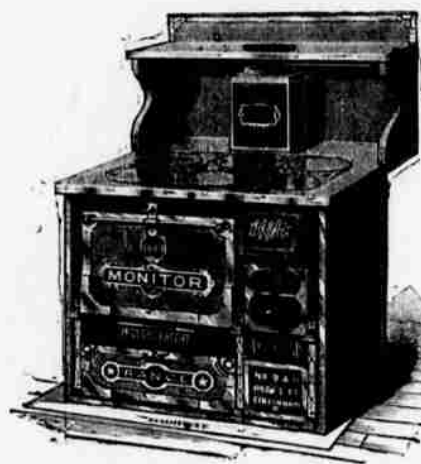

OBLIGATION AND OPPORTUNITY.

The victory gives the democrats in congress a great opportunity and imposes upon them a great responsibility.

With the senate and the presidency in republican hands the newly elected democratic house cannot undo the mischiefs done by the Fifty-first congress or repeal the legislation in hostility to the people which the people have rebuked with so strenuous an emphasis. But with their great majority in the house the democrats will have at any rate an unobstructed chance to reform the methods by which the present house has accomplished its will, and they owe it to the country to work that reform.

It will be the especial privilege and duty of the democratic house to reform, once for all, the system by which members of the minority are unequipped for partisan reasons. That is a crying evil which can never be cured by any moral suasion or protest addressed to a small and insecure majority.

It will always be practised where the house is close until a new system of determining election cases shall be adopted in lieu of the present system of determining them by partisan vote in the house itself.

With their overwhelming majority the democrats of the Fifty-second congress can apply the remedy. It will be their plain duty to provide for the reference of all contested election cases to a court of justice for an impartial hearing of the evidence and a judicial report upon the merits of each. Such a system once instituted could never be overthrown. The popular sense of fairness would not permit its abandonment.

A great victory is an obligation as well as an opportunity.

Blain the Man.

WASHINGTON Nov 12.—H. C. Lodge member of congress and author of the election bill, is credited with the following utterance.

I attribute the defeat in Massachusetts to one man and one utterance of that man more than any other thing. It was the declaration of J. G. Blain that the McKinley bill, not sell a barrel of pork or flour and it did more harm than all the assertions of the democrats together. The party was discredited by a party leader and one who has been looked up to as an oracle. The men in that state who believe in Blain proved largely indifferent to the success of the candidates. Blain is responsible for our defeat, while I prefer not to be quoted now, I shall before long seize the opportunity to repeat in public what I now say to you in confidence.

A Side Show.

COLUMBUS Nov 12.—There was a sensational tragedy at the racetrack today. The grand stand was packed with people. After the conclusion of the gentlemen race T. Dawson left his sulky and went behind the judge stand. In a few seconds a pistol shot was heard and saw Dawson running pursued Dick and Robert Howard and J. Bickelstaff who was firing at him. In a minute Dawson returned fire but soon fell and expired. The assailants were not injured. The tragedy was the outcome of a family quarrel Dawson having deserted Howard's sister. There is much excitement The Howards refuse to speak.

No More Consumption.

BERLIN Nov 12.—A Frankfurt telegram says the emperor has made a personal gift of \$250,000 to Prof Koch and another of the same amount to endow a national institute for the production of anti-consumption lymph used in Koch's process.

Figures Speak.

PORTLAND Nov 12.—Washington is down in the census returns for 349,516 inhabitants and Oregon for 312,490. Yet Washington has never cast as many votes by 20 per cent as Oregon. The explanation is that in Washington the census was fully taken while in Oregon there was really no census at all. As Washington shows 350,000 inhabitants with 60,000 voters Oregon with 75,000 voters can have no less than 400,000 inhabitants. This also is just about the proportion of inhabitants to voters in California, Minnesota, Nebraska Colorado and other states.

The city of Seattle at an election held last Tuesday threw 4109 votes. Tacoma at the same time threw 4322 votes. The combined vote of the two cities was 8431. The election at Portland last June was \$690 and Portland and E. Portland together 11,910.
