

MAKES A SPECTACLE OF HIMSELF.

The Brownsville Times man is making a ludicrous spectacle of himself. His course disgusts his friends and he becomes a laughing stock to the public. It says: "It, (the DEMOCRAT,) affirms that the Times claims that the north part of the county is taxing the south part at a greater rate than the north part." This the Times says "is as false as can be." We will see whether our statement "is false as it can be." In one issue that paper said this: "For the last ten or fifteen years the northern half has been managing affairs in their own way, taxing the southern half without its having a representation. This the Times can not deny. This proves that part of our statement which alleges that the Times said the north half was taxing the south half. Now as to the other part of the statement. In its issue of October 3rd, it said: "We wish to prove, first that we, (the south part,) pay more than our just proportion of taxes." In its issue of Sept. 19th, it said: "It, (meaning the DEMOCRAT,) did not deny that the citizens in the southern part of the county have been paying more taxes in proportion to their actual wealth than those in the northern half." Again it said: "The fact that the tax payers of the south half have been, and are now, paying more than their just proportion of taxes remains the same." Now sum all this up and see if the DEMOCRAT is not right. If it be true, as the Times says, that, for the last ten or fifteen years the north half has been taxing the south half, and that the south half have been, and are now, paying more than their just proportion of taxes, then the conclusion is irresistible that the north part of the county is taxing the south part at a greater rate than the north half. If the Times chooses to dispute this it must falsify its own words to do it. Now what becomes of its upstart, flippant charge that the DEMOCRAT falsifies about. We could say that when the Times man says a DEMOCRAT man said to him that "if Albany did not take the steps she is taking they would not get the bridge as the county did not want it," or that "it is a common evil that Salem and cities all over the United States resort to in order to get bridges," the DEMOCRAT man referred says that the Times man falsifies, aye, worse than that, but then we are loth to introduce that style of billingsgate which appears so suitable to some newspapers. The Times in quoting from the DEMOCRAT says we "whoop it up for the Albany bridge and say nothing whatever in behalf of the people who have time and again petitioned for appropriations." The Times knew when it made this statement that it cut its quotation in two and that it did it for the purpose of deceiving. It left out the words in the DEMOCRAT that would have convicted it of open, deliberate falsehood. This is what the DEMOCRAT said in connection with the quotation made by the Times:

And we say, once for all, to the Times, that the DEMOCRAT is broad enough in its conception of its duty to the taxpayers of Linn county to favor the construction of good safe bridges on all the streams of the county. This means that we favor the building of bridges on the Calapooia and Muddy with as much earnestness as the building of them any where else.

Thus does the Times stand convicted by its own words. Shame on the newspaper that will attempt to create prejudice against others by malicious, premeditated, wicked misrepresentation. What language could be stronger than ours, that we are in "favor of the construction of good, safe bridges on all the streams of the county. This means that we favor the building of bridges on the Calapooia and Muddy with as much earnestness as the building of them any where else." And in the very face of these words the Times says the DEMOCRAT said nothing whatever in behalf of the people who have time and again petitioned for appropriations. It is no fault of the DEMOCRAT if the Times editor is too stupid to understand such language or too knavish to admit its fairness. The consolation the DEMOCRAT has is that its readers in the north, south, east and west part of the county do understand it, and are not to be misled by the misrepresentations of the Times.

SERIOUS CHARGES.

The Brownsville Times has been attacking the county court for not repairing bridges in the south part of the county. These criticisms have been regarded by nine tenths of the people of the county as the fulminations of an eccentric mind. But in its last issue it makes a charge too serious to be allowed to pass unnoticed. It says: "They, (the people of Albany,) should remember that the long list of delinquent taxes is headed by some of the most prominent citizens of the north part (of the county) who have been allowed to escape paying their taxes because of favoritism until the delinquent tax list aggregates the enormous sum of \$30,000." Now, this is a most serious matter. It is one of great public concern. Now, how could this favoritism of which the Times speaks, be shown? First, it could be shown by the assessor by placing a far less value upon the favorite's property than he does upon those not favored. Does the Times mean to say that this is the way the favoritism of which it speaks was shown? Second, it might be shown by the equalization board in not increasing the assessment of individuals when it knew their property was not properly assessed, or by reducing the assessment of the favored person when it was assessed already low enough. Does the Times mean to make this charge? Third, this favoritism might be shown by the sheriff not collecting taxes from the favored individuals. Does the Times make this latter charge? Come now, it is your duty to speak specifically and directly? Name the officer that has been guilty of showing the favoritism you refer to.
