The first few days of the coming session of congress will show whether Tom Reed still considers himself to be a bigger man than the American people.

Mr Reed, of Maine, made five speeches in New York during the late campaign. They were in five different congressional districts. The result was a democratic gain of five congressmen.

In the lower house of the Kansas legislature are only four lawyers. It is said there are fears that many laws will be passed that will not stand the test and that lawyers throughout the state are expecting a rich harvest to grow out of the legislation enacted by this new legislature.

Tinware, carpets dress, goods, tools, boots and shoes, crockery, glassware, lumber and furniture will be marked up in price or scaled down in quality. The plague of monopoly taxation is upon the American people, and shut their eyes to it as they may, deny it as the paid organ orators of the trusts may, they will feel its cruel oppressions more and more keenly from this time forth. The robbery is in progress. There is only one question: Will the people submit to it?

The most overwhelming victory in the late elections was in Harrison's own state—Indiana. The democratic majority on the state ticket was 19,579 and on the total congressional vote the majority is 34,928. The democrats elected 12 of the 13 congressmen. The legislature stands senate, democrats 34, republicans 16. In the house democrats 73, republicans 27. The democratic majority on joint ballot being 64.

The legislature of Illinois is so nearly a tie on joint ballot that there is no telling who will be elected United States Senator. In the senate the republicans have 27 senators and the democrats 24. In the house the democrats have 77, the republicans 73 and the farmers mutual benefit association 3. These are James Cockerel, H H Moore, and Herman Tanberack. The latter has pledged himself to not vote for Palmer. Moore ran on the democratic ticket and will support Palmer. Cockerel, although a vigorous Jacksonian democrat, ran against a democrat. Democrats count on his voting for Palmer. If two of the alliance men refuse to vote with the democrats there will be a tie on joint ballot.

A Washington special says that politicians in Washington, who profess to be posted, say that the movement looking to the defeat of Don Cameron is a formidable one, and that the senator is badly frightened at the outlook. It is also said that the man who is likely to come out as a candidate is Postmaster-General John Wanamaker. Trusted friends of Wanamaker's freely admit that his ambitions are to become the controlling man in the republican party of Pennsylvania, and they are not sure but that he cherishes a desire to occupy a seat in the senate as a means to that end. Quay is friendly to Cameron and Wanamaker, but owing to recent events neither of these gentlemen seem particularly anxious at present for the active support of the chairman of the national committee.

No better argument in favor of changing the mode of electing the U S Senators can be adduced than the muddle into which the election of one in New Hampshire has thrown the Legislature of that State. The people of that State voted on Nov 4th for a lower tariff, but they will not for months know whether a protectionist or a man representing their sentiment will be elected. The same is true of Kansas and S Dakota. The people of Illinois have declared at the polls for Gen Palmer, but as a result of a death of one man may send a Republican back to the Senate, as was the case when Logan defeated Morrison in 1885. The Democratic states of Connecticut and New York are misrepresented in the Senate because of this infamous system. There are men in the Senate who would never be thought of by their constituents if they had to submit their chances of election to the people. Gerry's maneuvering is the offspring of the present system of electing the U S Senators by state Legislature.

IOWA'S OFFICIAL VOTE.

Official returns of the election for state officers received from ninety-six counties, the remaining three counties having been reported unofficially, show the election of the entire republican ticket by pluralities ranging from 356 for railroad commissioner to 3,500 for secretary of state. The vote is as follows on principal offices.

Secretary of State—McFarland, (rep) 192, 064; Chamberlain, (dem) 188,264.
Auditor of State—Lyons, (rep) 191,356; Winters, (dem) 188,471.
Treasurer of State—Beeson, (rep), 190,992; White, (dem), 189,339.
Railway commissioner—Luke, (rep), 189,931; Day, (dem), 189,565.

Attorney General Stone, republican, has 3,779 plurality. Rothrock for Judge of the Supreme court, has 3,290; Gray for clerk, has 3,047, and Raymond, for reporter, has 3,448. The total vote is the largest vote ever cast outside of a presidential year. The democratic majority in the state on the congressional vote is 7586.
