HOW BLOOD WILL TELL.

According to the Chicago Mail's Washington special M P Handy is to be appointed consul general to Cairo, the post last filled by the Eugene Schuyler, one of the most accomplished men the American diplomatic service has had in many years. Mr Handy is a newspaper writer, and has served New York and Philadelphia papers from Washington for several years. The salary of consul general at Cairo is \$5,000 a year. If Mr Handy is as artful as George Butler, nephew of Benjamin Butler, who held the place during the administration of General Grant, he will be able to make it worth \$30,000 to \$40,000 a year.

The stories of Butler's escapades are many. When Mr Fish became secretary of state he sent out a circular letter to the ministers and consuls of the United States instructing them to employ as far as possible with the customs and manners of the countries to which they accredited. One morning, to Mr Fish's horror, he received a communication from Colonel Butler to the effect that he had received general letter of instructions No. 109, and that in compliance therewith he had fitted out the United States consulate in the most recherche Egyptian style.

For particulars he referred to the inclosed itemized bill, and he also mentioned the fact that he had drawn a draft on the United States government, which had been duly honored by the leading banker of Cairo. A more wonderful communication never shocked a decorous secretary of state. Among other items was one for six Circassian girls, 4,000 piasters each; nine ditto Nubian. He begged to assure the secretary that his taste had been unimpeachable, for he had availed himself of the Khedive's chief eunuch in selecting them.

Being called upon for an explanation Mr Butler replied that he had acted in obedience to the secretary's instructions to conform to the habits and customs of the country he was in. All gentlemen in the Orient keep harems, and he did not propose that the United States should be outdone in the dignity of their chief representative if he "broke" the state department to do it. As a matter of fact Mr Fish paid the draft out of the contingent fund of the state department. Ben Butler was at that time in the full flower of his influence, and Mr Fish did not like to quarrel with him on his nephew's account.

Young Butler made about seven them his salary by a simple arrangement with Mourad Pasha, the governor of the city. A favorite pastime of this Egyptian official was to occasionally bastinado a few until he gave up everything he had. Now if a Hebrew trading in Cairo could show papers of American citizenship signed by the consul general he was perfectly safe. These papers were to be obtained at prices varying with the means of the purchaser. The proceeds of this traffic were divided between the governor and the consul general.

A criticism on current life was made the other day by a New Yorker, whose ideas are always worth hearing, that the public as a rule is prone to be interested in things afar. We ignore the extremes of misery and poverty as they exist in our own cities, and are eager to listen to delectable tales of the cannibals of the South Sea Islands. We are not especially anxious to know the true inwardness of life or conditions in Alaska, but we pour out libations and sing psalms of joy if we may become familiar with the Dark Continent. It would, even indeed, that "every ship is a romantic object save the one in which we sail."

Treasurer Huston's report that the national debt has been diminished more than \$100,000,000 during the past year simply means that forced payments were made upon immature obligations as a result of surplus revenue extorted from the people by unnecessary taxation. There will be no more such reports. The surplus is spent, the revenues are overmortgaged and within six months a deficiency will occur if new taxes shall not be imposed.

The corn crop in Nebraska is smaller than was anticipated. Corn is selling in Lincoln for from fifty to fifty-three cents a bushel. Farmers having nothing to feed with, and vast quantities of hogs, half fattened, are being rushed to market and sacrificed at very low prices. In many Western counties there is much destitution. Many homesteads are heavily encumbered, and a few have been abandoned.
