COMMENTS ON THE MESSAGE.

The following are some of the comments made editorially by the New York papers on President Harrison's message:

The World: "The President had nothing to say and did not know how to say it."

Evening Sun: "President Harrison has issued his annual message. It is a long one. The *Evening Sun* prints: Read it if you like, but it is hardly worth it."

Herald: "Mr Harrison's message does not rise above the dull monotony of platitudes. It lacks the merit of either rhetoric or logic. It will be read from courtesy, but without interest. As an exhibit of statesmanship it is a serious disappointment, for it conveys the impression that the writer has no convictions or thinks it impolite to express them."

Times: "The President has forgotten little and learned nothing. He meets the congress in which his party provoked defeat on its reassembling with a tediously urgent exhortation to remedy none of the mistakes already made, to press forward in the same line and trust to that providence which the French say watches over Americans and fools. One subject Mr Harrison was bound to discuss—the tariff; a second he was chosen to bring forward—the Force bill. On neither has he anything new to say."

Sun: "The principal thing in President Harrison's message is the zealous recommendation that the Force bill should be taken up and pressed through congress. There is little need of any further argument upon this subject. This bill is simply a revolution. Its one purpose is to continue the dominant party in power, and to this end its promoters are willing to destroy local self government, to overthrow the rights of the citizens and of communities, and to change the republic of free elections into a concentrated party despotism."

"This scheme should be resisted determinedly and uncompromisingly by every democrat. If necessary every means of delay and obstruction should be resorted to in congress. The mischiefs that are sure to arise from such political revolution are so great and so grave as to overshadow every question. Whatever difference of opinion may exist among democrats concerning other subjects, let there be unity and co-operation concerning this. Preserve the liberty of the people and put down the republican conspiracy to destroy them."

Tribune: "The message of the President is a calm, dignified and able document, which appeals to the sober thought of Americans and will strongly influence public opinion. It is as quiet and confident as if there had been no election since that in which the President and his party had been deliberately instructed by the people with the charge of the government. It is a message eminently fitted to recall the republican voters of 1888 to the sense of their responsibilities and to remind them that the national policy for which they then declared deserves their unwavering support."

Star: "It is fashioned after traditional pattern as to the subjects discussed and the order in which they are mentioned. For literary and forensic merit it barely reaches mediocrity, while politically it is a purely partisan plea in extenuation of the course of the administration and the congress which the people have just decisively condemned."

This is significant! An administration that began with a surplus of \$100,000,000 now find a deficiency of \$76,000,000 in a single department. If the Republican Congress had displayed half the care in looking after the finances that they did in buying the soldier vote, by granting additional pensions, the Treasury would be in a much better condition. The \$76,000,000 have to be paid and the tax-payers must foot the bill. What think the farmers, mechanic and laboring men? It will not be long before they are again asked to put their hands in their pockets. And this will not be the end of it; the Republican party is not half through with subsidizing the soldier vote. Our pension system is prolific of soft snags all round and among the beneficiaries is Corporal Tanner, late Commissioner of Pensions, whose fees, as a claim agent, since he was turned out of office, little over a year ago, amounted to \$197,000. How the tax-payers are blest!
