THE BLUE BUCKET MINES.

Albany, Dec. 6, 1890.

Seeing a short item in the DEMOCRAT in regard to this interesting subject, will you please give space to the following. Hearing several persons speaking about the Blue Bucket mines, in eastern Oregon, a few months ago, and being a descendant of one of the members of the party, I am prepared to say that the following are a few of the main facts in the case:

In crossing the plains in the early days it was reported that a "nugget" had been found by some parties in the canyon, and the name Blue Bucket had been given to the place on account of the blue clayey ground they were camped on at the time. I am prepared to say that the "nugget" was found and weighed something near nine pounds, and is at present in the state of Oregon. I was told by the party who gave up their tent for the "nugget" to be found in, that it consisted of a 9 pound girl, and that he slept under a wagon that night.
