ANOTHER BOSS "DOWNED."

That corrupt, dangerous political boss, W. E. Chandler has been downed as will be seen by the following dispatch:

The defeat of the republican attempt to "fix" the next legislature is a decided victory for Congressman Gallinger and a broad defeat for the Chandler faction, who were committed fully to the scheme.

Now that the legislature has adjourned and the smoke cleared away some idea of the complexion of the next house can be formed and to the evident satisfaction of the democrats.

The result of the extra session was solely the election of the new republican clerk, who has the making of the roll of the house.

The passage of the majority report by the house simply instructs him that he must depend on the constitution and statute for his guidance in making the rolls.

Now there are 40 "if entitled" members elect of the new legislature, that is, members elected from towns assumed to have an increase of population, under the census of 1890 over that of 1880, sufficient therefor.

Of these, 27 are republicans and 13 are democrats.

From towns formerly classed, but because of the classification system, assumed to have the right to individual representation and consequently known as pro rata towns, there have been 33 representatives elected. Twenty-two of these are democrats and 12 are republicans.

In 17 of these pro rata towns 14 democrats and three republicans were elected under the apportionment bill passed in 1881.

Should all the "if entitled" members be excluded from the roll and all the pro-rata added, the democrats will have a majority.

The present law distinctly states that the census of 1880 must be the basis of representation, and despite the action of the republicans instructions that the clerk enroll them, he can only follow the statutes.

The new legislature is an independent body and any attempt to seat illegal members will be easily remedied by the new body itself. The democrats are jubilant.

The *Mercury* tells us that the United States grand jury of Indiana has instituted an investigation of the right of paupers to vote. This can not be. The right to vote is determined exclusively by the state, and the United States has no more authority over the question of the right of a man to vote in Indiana, (except in so far as to see that no man's right shall be denied or abridged by any state on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude,) than England would have. If the laws of Indiana confer the right to vote upon paupers, the United States can not interfere with that right. Under the constitution of Oregon a pauper may vote. The policy may be a bad one, but the federal government can not interfere.

Mr. Hitt, the well known republican congressman from Illinois, advocates the removal of all restrictions upon commercial intercourse between the United States and Canada. That is to say Mr. Hitt wants to have free trade absolute with that country. With free trade absolute with that country, with Blaine pleading for free reciprocal trade with South America and Hitt absolute free with Canada, are we to think of the alarming tendency of republican leaders to the doctrines of the Cobden club? Shall we not conclude that British and Brazilian gold are having telling effect upon these leaders?

The report is out that Joseph Pulitzer and his fellow owners have sold the New York *World* to Geo. W. Childs, proprietor of the Philadelphia *Ledger* and A. W. Drexel the great banker of Philadelphia. The price is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$3,500,000. The property is to be transferred on January 1. The sale includes the new fourteen story building, the presses, engines, machinery, etc., the *Evening* World plant and the good will of both papers.

Editorial Democrat:

Here is an amendment offered by Hon. R. P. Bland, of Mo., to the tariff bill lately passed by congress:

"That it shall be lawful for the farmers of each state and territory of the United States to organize or establish for themselves such agencies as they may deem expedient for the purpose of exporting, selling and exchanging the products of farms of the United States in foreign markets and to import free of duty into this country all articles of commerce produced in such foreign markets by the sale or exchange of the farm products of this country: Provided, that all subjects of trade or commerce so imported free of duty shall be for the use and benefit of the farmers so importing the same, and for their own consumption and shall not be sold in the markets of this country in competition with like articles on which a duty shall have been paid. That it shall be the duty of the secretary of the treasury to make all useful rules and regulations to properly carry into effect the foregoing provisions relating to the sale and exchange of the products of American farms in foreign markets."

This was surely a measure of relief for the overtaxed farmers. But under the lead of McKinley, it was voted down. Was it a just measure? Can any good reason be suggested why it should not have been adopted? I am informed that Mr. Herman voted against this measure. Why did he do it?
