It is good to have the courage to welcome a new order of things; to discern the gladness and the glory of new possibilities; to welcome the angels that stand about the throne of life—honor generosity and sympathy.

"No flippancy of treatment," says the Keokuk (Iowa) Gate City (rep.), "would be in place as to Mr Grover Cleveland's speech at the Allen G. Thurman banquet. It is a speech worthy the leader of a great party in its strength and masterfulness."

Christmas is the preacher who emphasizes the fact that the religion which it celebrates is adapted to human nature. If it were to fancy a wholly Christianized world, it would be a world inspired by the spirit of Christmas—a bright, friendly, beneficent generous, sympathetic, naturally helpful world. A man who is habitually mean, selfish, narrow, is a man without Christmas in his soul.

In anticipation of the increased cost of carpet wools under the McKinley tariff, the Philadelphia manufacturers of Brussels carpets proposed that 40 per cent. of the looms be stopped and 40 per cent. of the weavers dismissed, so that the selling prices could be proportionately increased. The New England manufacturers would not assent to this, and urged the formation of a combination, or trust, for the purpose of advancing prices. This is in process of being effected.

The failure of Edward H. Ammidown, the highest high priest of protection yet evolved by the tariff craze, is a curious commentary—coming at this time—on the effect of Mr Ammidown's friend McKinley's bill. Mr Ammidown has for several years been President of the American Protective Tariff League, and has been such a devoted adherent of his fetish that when his willow idol and ideal statesman, Blaine, came out for reciprocity, Mr Ammidown was severely shocked and came very near washing his hands of the man of Maine. Mr Ammidown is a portly, white-haired and ruddy-faced gentleman whose business reputation has always been one of the best, and many friends will hope to see him pull through even if the McKinley tariff doesn't.

W. J. Penrose, the editor of the *Daily Mining Journal* of Butte, was in Seattle the other day on his way to Victoria. In conversation he stated that when the legislature of his state meets this winter, an entirely new election for the United States senate will be held.

Senators Power and Sanders, who were last year declared elected by the republicans, will be fought, and democratic nominees be elected by this legislature, which is democratic on joint ballot by seven.

Mr Penrose is himself a member of the legislature. He does not think the senate will admit the democratic nominees. The movement has the hearty co-operation of Governor Toole.

HOW IT WAS.

A German business man of Albany tells us of a letter he received a few days ago from his brother-in-law, also a German, living in Detroit, Michigan. The Detroit man has been a life-long republican. He writes: "Now as to politics. Who would have thought that Michigan would ever become a democratic state, and stranger still, who that knows me, would have thought that I would ever help make my adopted state democratic. But so it is, and so I did. We have been studying the tariff question here and have concluded that the only safe, honest policy for this government to adopt is to permit its citizens to sell their products in the highest markets and buy the necessities of life in the cheapest markets. We can't vote the republican ticket as long as we believe in this doctrine. I attended the great democratic demonstration held in this city after the election. There were ten thousand people present. Hundreds of republicans were there, equally happy as democrats. Would you believe it? Seven or eight of the vice presidents of the meeting were influential German republicans. They are tired of McKinleyism and Readism."
