FARMER'S ALLIANCE.

The Jacksonville (Fla.) Times-Union, in its issue of December 14th, says:

Since the final adjournment at Ocala, incontestable proof has been brought out to show the existence of a gigantic plot to use the national organization as the means of promoting the third-party scheme. A significant fact is the vote of northwestern Alliance men, who are mostly republicans, and who came to Ocala with the purpose of forcing the alliance to endorse their pet scheme for a third party. It soon became apparent, however, that such endorsement could not be secured, and when the sub-treasury scheme came up, the northwestern men were found solid in their support of it, although their political affiliations and the sentiment of the people they are supposed to represent would naturally have led to open opposition to this measure. The leaders in the third party movement from that section are McGrath, of Kansas; Loucks, of North Dakota; Wardell, of South Dakota; and Willets, of Kansas, and they are warmly supported by the delegates from Wisconsin and other near-by states. During a tour of the state, which has been in progress for the past four or five days, these third party people have unbosomed themselves to a certain extent in conversation with their fellow-excursionists, and their admissions have laid the political scheme which has prompted their every act. Their statements are to this effect: They are really opposed to the sub-treasury bill, regard it as wrong in principle, and as a legislative device, which can result only in financial ruin to the farmers and every other industrial class, that people of their section are opposed to it, and that they, as delegates, were particularly charged with the mission to defeat the measure when they left their homes. They say also that upon their return they will explain their action in this way: "That the sub-treasury demand is of such a nature that it can never gain the support of the democracy of the southern states, and that any attempt to secure such democratic support can end only in a split in the democratic ranks in the south. This, they say, will break up the solid south, and this is the end they had in view. In support of the general policy several of these plotters have been placed upon record. President McGrath, of Kansas, is quoted as saying: "We saw that by making the sub-treasury bill an issue in the south we could break up the democratic party." Willets, of Kansas, is quoted as saying: "We supported the sub-treasury bill to divide the south and break up the bourbon democracy."

RETALIATION.

A dispatch from France says:

The tariff bill, as now shaped under the hands of the committee of the chamber, outdoes the McKinley bill in protectionism. The Gironde Commerce League, the leading free-trade body, has issued a strong manifesto, denouncing it as tending to surround France with a Chinese wall, the inevitable result of which will be the ruin of the country's agriculture, commerce and shipping interests for the temporary profit of great manufacturers. It is believed, however, if the government can assure the safety of the Bordeaux wine trade under reciprocity, the opposition of the league will disappear.

Then comes a dispatch from Kansas city which says:

A party of Mexicans and Americans from Mexico are here studying the pork-packing business. One of them in an interview said the Mexican Government will undoubtedly pass the bill excluding American pork products in retaliation for the bill. In anticipation of this the gentlemen are studying the business in order to start the industry in Mexico when the law is enacted.

From which it will be seen that these countries propose to retaliate against us for the passage of the McKinley bill. This is the most natural thing in the world, and it will not be long until we see our folly.
