SOMEWHAT HUMOROUS.

A Buckeye's Conception of Fruit and Fruit Culture.

The people of Oakville, in this county, are paying considerable attention to the raising of fruit, and very naturally commune with their eastern friends on the subject. A prominent man of that place did so, getting the following bright letter, which he hands us for publication, in order to benefit fruit-raisers generally: "Your kind letter of recent date is at hand and contents noted. Am glad to hear of your bright prospects. When you speak of setting out 1000 fruit trees my mouth almost shapes itself for shedding tears. You also mention something about grubbing the ground before planting to trees. This reminds me of my boyhood days in Ohio, when I used to earn my grub by grubbing. I never enjoyed it very much as a past-time until the time was past and the pay was in sight. Extracting roots is a painful necessity, and never was of great pleasure to me. Since leaving the timber country I have had occasion to let a small contract for taking out some old roots, and although I was right there and had an easy seat, and was not asked to assist in the work—in fact was requested to keep hands off—yet in some way I felt for the fellow workman and my interest in him was such that I think I sweat fully as much as he. It is similar to 'filling a long-felt-want,' and the more nerve one has, the more nerve one needs. But, let us return to the orchard. I like that move. I think it is the thing to do with that land, and I almost wish I had an interest in that fruit farm. It might not injure me if you being 'Cherry' help to 'Plum' my 'Currant' expenses. I do not wonder at you being 'Cherry' when you contemplate the results, which is shown by actual 'Fig' trees to be so good as to 'Seek-no-Further.' A 'Pippin' to the matter would make a 'Maiden Blush,' however much she wants to 'Fear' with 'Tallmansweet,' who is constantly being 'Cider.' Both being in the 'Bloom' of youth, should, with he as 'Roman-Stem' the tide together for rods and rods at least. Every 'Sheepnose' that a 'Rambo' is 'Juice' right in the fall. But later Bro. 'Johnethan' and Miss 'Bell Flower' are in great demand by all picnic people. They are solid friends, good keepers and wear well by acquaintance. Miss 'Siberia Crabb,' being a drawl, makes a fair show. But notwithstanding her 'Trunk' checked entirely through, free of charge, she brings her manager very little else than 'Sauce.' Sometimes there is a 'Jam' that generally ends in a 'Pickle.' The 'Willow-Twig' has produced less 'Salubrious Sweet' than the 'Young's Delight' than the 'Candy Red,' yet I think produces better results in youth than is always admitted. Place her near the kitchen and wash house where the reflection will have a healthy influence on her, and then her fruit will be in good taste. Don't plant any 'Chestnuts.' Well really I have no right to advise you about fruit culture. I am only a 'Buckeye,' as you know and never saw Oregon, and of course what I say is cheap and thin, and don't cost anything, but if I have my health and can so 'Orange' matters here, will try at some future time to learn more of fruit and fruit culture, even if I have to go to Oregon."
