**A SCIO ESSAY.**  
The following essay, read by Miss Amanda Bridges, before the literary association of the Scio school, W. A. McKee, principal, has been handed us for publication:

**THE FACE THE INDEX OF THE MIND.**  
There is a saying, and a true one, too, "That the face is an index to the mind." We see examples of this every day; for never do we meet a stranger but what we form an opinion of him; and we are governed almost entirely, in forming this opinion, by the expression of the face. It is true, also, that we are sometimes deceived. But this is owing to the fact that we are not good facial readers, and not that the face betrays the mind or character within, or the kind of a life the person has led previous to our meeting him. Our success in life, both financially and morally depends, in a great measure on our ability to read faces accurately. Business men are constantly being brought in contact in their dealings, with men of whom they have no knowledge of their character and no means of gaining any information about them save what they can read in their faces; and they must be governed in the amount of dealings or confidence they put in them, by the amount of honesty and manhood their physiognomy portrays, and if they have made this study they need rarely be deceived. And it is the same morally. We all know that we are influenced by the kind of company we keep. And it often happens, in this life, that one is thrust among entire strangers, and in order that we may choose the right kind of associates, and avoid the evils that always follow the association with base and unprincipled persons, it is necessary that we have something to guide us, and if we only read closely what is written in the faces of those by whom we are surrounded, we need scarcely ever err in the choice of companions; for there is as much difference in the faces of the rogue and the honest, upright man, as there is in the lives they lead. A visit to the jail or state prison will prove the truth of this, even to the most unobservant. Then if we wish to make a favorable impression on those with whom we are brought in contact, and would be chosen by the better classes as an associate, we must have the right kind of faces ourselves, and the way to have the right kind of faces, we must lead the right kind of lives, and have pure thoughts, for as the index of a book is in harmony with what the book itself is, just so our faces must be, and are, in harmony with what our thoughts and lives are.

### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

**Poisoned at Eugene.**  
EUGENE, Dec. 26.—A serious case of accidental poisoning occurred in the family of J. H. Wilkinson, of this city, yesterday morning. Mr. Wilkinson and wife, and family of six children were taken suddenly sick with all the symptoms of poisoning, and all day yesterday they remained in that condition, scarcely able to take their medicine. A physician attended them for poison. They are now satisfied that the poison was in some head cheese which they had eaten. The meat was bought at the market. All will probably recover.

**An Eastern Storm.**  
NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—The predicted arrival this morning. Pedestrians are few and far between. Surface cars are making poor progress, in spite of the fact that four horses are trying to do the usual work of two. Navigation in the rivers and bay is seriously interfered with. So far no accidents are reported. This storm, which is from west to east, has been since the blizzard of March, 1888, has been giving the south a taste of its quality since early yesterday morning. Its center has worked way up from Louisiana to Tennessee.

**Fast Hignaling.**  
SPOKANE FALLS, Dec. 26.—Four of the fastest sprinters in the United States took part in a foot race, best two in three heats, at Twickenham park, yesterday evening. The contestants were E. D. Skinner, C. F. Gibson, John Flynn, and Jack Gibson. E. D. Skinner and C. F. Gibson ran the first heat, Skinner winning in 9 3/4 seconds, John Flynn and Jack Gibson ran the second, Gibson winning in 9 1/2 seconds. The winners of the two heats postponed the decisive heat, on account of the lateness of the hour, until next Sunday.

**A Prineville Man's Suicide.**  
TACUMA, Or., Dec. 26.—Henry Deebhead, a freighter from Prineville, attempted suicide Wednesday evening in the east end of the city. He had gambled, lost heavily, and become despondent. The pistol had entered his right breast and raged downward. The pistol was held close to the body and the cat was burned. He is still in a critical condition and not expected to live.

**Jews in the U.S.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—The division of vital statistics of the census office has prepared a bulletin containing a summary of the results of special inquiry concerning the Jews in this country. The inquiry resulted in the return of 10,618 completed family schedules, embracing 60,630 living persons on the 31st day of December, 1890, and in those families there have been 2148 marriages, 6038 births and 2662 deaths during the five year ending at that date.
