A BIG PRICE.—The "Oregon Wonder," now called Linus, has just been sold to C. H. & H. W. Eaton, for \$30,000, and will be used on their stock farm at Lexington, Mass. A Boston paper gets off the following good joke, said in earnest: "His owners were the celebrated Rutherford Brothers, the millionaire cattle dealers of Oregon, who sold him to Eaton Brothers for much less than his real value in consideration of their great reputation as thoroughbred stock breeders." At Albuquerque, N. M., he was taken from the car for a few hours and a syndicate of wealthy gentlemen offered \$50,000 cash for him; but his present owners say that nothing short of \$100,000 would tempt them, having also been offered \$37,500 for a half interest in him since his arrival in New England. He will be exhibited at the World's fair, and afterwards sent to Europe. It will be remembered that Mr. Adams, the man who raised the Oregon Wonder near Millers, in this county, committed suicide.

OLD RECORDS.—Perhaps the oldest book of record in the court house, is volume 1, of the county court proceedings. The first entry in which is dated Dec. 11, 1849. It records the fact that the probate court convened at the school house on the Calapooia, and organized the county by John McCoy, acting J. P., qualifying Wm. McCaw clerk of the court, who qualified John McCoy and A. Kirk, as probate judges. Isaac Hutchens as sheriff, N. D. Jack as assessor, John Bateman as treasurer, Jas. Hill as J. P., and H. Spaulding as school commissioner. The next court was held on May 22, when S. Miller was granted a license to run a ferry on the Santiam. The assessor made his returns. The county was laid off into precincts, and an election ordered on first Monday in June. June 11 letters of administration were issued to W. P. Maley, on estate of Thos. Baley. The election returns were canvassed. On June 18 N. D. Jack qualified as assessor. On July 1 Jas. Crabtree gave bonds as J. P., H. Spaulding as school commissioner. J. Carl declined to qualify as probate judge. The county was laid off into five townships. It took the most of the year for the officers to qualify.

THE SWEDISH NIGHTINGALE will appear Jan. 10th. "The Swedish National Ladies' Octette" concert for the benefit of the Linn monument fund, given last night at Central Music hall, filled the spacious auditorium largely with people of Scandinavian birth or antecedents. The organization is a double quartette of young Swedish ladies, who appear in the picturesque Dalecarlian costume. Their voices are unusually pure and strong, and blend beautifully. Their repertoire is exceedingly large, a proof of which is the fact that of the nineteen numbers on the program twelve were sung by the lady octette, who in response to vociferous recalls sang fourteen extra numbers. TEACHERS' MEETING.

Following is a report of the Teachers' meeting at Lebanon, Or.:

FRIDAY EVENING. Meeting called to order by Supt. Russell in the chair, and a large number of teachers and citizens present. Remarks by Prof. Russell, pointing out the good to be derived from the teachers' meetings in general.

Song, America. Recitation, Suggestion by Prof. Wright that we have a Query box. Adopted. The address by O. P. Coshove, Jr., on "English as she is taught," brought out the fact that much of the school work of to-day consists of cramming the child's mind with a conglomerated mass of knowledge that can never do him any good.

Song, "Cricket on the Hearth," by Miss Doud. Quite an interest was taken in the question from the query box. Recitation by Miss Torbit. Song, Home ward Bound. Meeting adjourned at 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY MORNING. A large number of questions were taken from the query box. A very interesting discussion followed, participated in by nearly all present.

Miss Ullery gave a class exercise in callisthenics, which was good. The discussion of Primary Arithmetic was next taken up and a very spirited discussion followed.

There were 25 teachers present. Miss Abbie Fry gave a recitation. Song by the school. Adjourned for dinner.

AFTERNOON. General questions of importance were discussed. Committee on School Law Amendments presented the following resolutions:

We, the undersigned members of the committee appointed by Supt. Russell, at the meeting held at Brownsville, Oregon, Nov. 21 and 22, 1890, to prepare recommendations asking for changes in our present school laws, do hereby submit the following: 1st. That in cases where teachers, who have held temporary certificates, are not permitted to teach in the interim of public examinations, that the law be so changed as to allow county superintendents to issue temporary certificates to such teachers as may upon examination prove themselves qualified to take the grade required under the present law at public examination.

2nd. Also, that when a certificate has expired by limitation before the holder thereof has taught under it the length of time required by law to enable him to a higher grade, the county superintendent may upon examination and approval, issue to such teacher another certificate of equal grade.

3rd. Also, that the county superintendent may hold public examinations in different sections of his county to accommodate bodies of teachers.

4th. Also, that teachers obtaining certificates from county superintendent shall not be required to pay any fee therefor.

5th. Also, that a copy of these resolutions be furnished to each of the county papers for publication and a copy sent to each of the senators and representatives of Linn county Or.
