LOCAL RECORD.

A PIONEER INCIDENT.—Vol. 1, of the county court proceedings of this county, gives an incident which has had a traditional reputation, and is sometimes mentioned by old settlers. At the November term of the court, 1850, William Bexford and John Edmondson entered a complaint of insanity against Jacob L. Coon. This was the first case of the kind in the county, perhaps in the territory. The business of the county was then done by three probate judges, John McCoy, Mr. Dunlap and J. Carl had been elected in June, but the latter did not qualify, hence Coon was tried before the two former, who found said Coon, says the record, partially insane and bound him over to keep the peace in a bond of \$500. As there was no asylum to which to send him, and he was probably more vicious and mean than denoted, the action was about all that could be done, and though the record gives no particulars, we surmise that it had a pretty good effect on Coon. The action of the court has generally been credited to Judge G. H. Baber, but the records show that Mr. Baber was elected at a special election in the latter part of November, and did not qualify until the 2nd of December, nearly a month after the peculiar event.

A SHOOTING ACCIDENT.—A few days ago, Prince, the twelve year old son of Robert Morgan, the well known and highly respected negro farmer, of Shedd, was out hunting, with several others, when he accidentally caught the hammer of the gun on a fence. It was discharged, the contents shattering the left hand, so that the thumb and parts of the next three fingers had to be amputated. The whole matter was an unfortunate one for Prince, beginning with the manner in which he secured the gun, which was by forging a Wells Fargo order at Shedd, while the agent was absent and sending it on an Albany firm for the gun, a nice \$40 one. The offense was soon discovered, leaving the boy without a gun. As he was so young, and it was his first dishonest act, always having been a very straightforward boy, nothing was done in the matter.

FOR TEN YEARS.—Mr John Briggs has handed the DEMOCRAT a tabulated weather report for ten years, which will be published in a few days. It shows the total rainfall for the past year to be only 41.30 inches. The highest for ten years was 62.12 inches in 1881, the lowest 31.51 inches, in 1889. The average for ten years was 43.40 inches, which certainly should take away from the valley the title of Wetfoot. The heaviest snowfall was 36 inches, equal to 3.6 inches of rain, all in December, 1885, the lowest 1 inch in 1883. The average fall of snow for the ten years was 17.68 inches. Over half the average rainfall was in the three winter months. These facts are interesting ones and the table should be pasted up.

KANSAS IMMIGRATION.—This noon two large freight cars covered with chicken coops attracted attention at the depot. A DEMOCRAT man, on inquiry, learned that the contents belonged to three families named Davis, Gibson and Rice, seventeen members in all. Besides stock, furniture, etc., on the inside were sixteen coops of almost featherless chickens on top of the cars, the birds having lost most of their feathers on the way. The cars left Wichita, Kan., two weeks ago, the people having resided near that famous bubble, and two of the men accompanied them. The remainder of the families are expected in a day or two. They wish to invest in stock farms and make this their home, having become tired of the frequent crop failures of that country.
