

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Indian Fight

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—The commissioner of Indian affairs this morning received the following dispatch from agent D. F. Royer, dated Pine Ridge Indian Agency, December 29:

On Wounded Knee creek this morning while soldier were disarming Big Foot's band after the surrender, a fight took place.

The commissioner of Indian affairs late this afternoon received a telegram from Special Agent Cooper, at Pine Ridge, saying that 150 Indians were killed and 30 wounded and captured. He also states that the Indians attacked a wagon-train this (Tuesday) morning, two miles north of the agency, killing one soldier of the advance guard.

The surgeon general received from Medical Director Hache, at Pine Ridge, a report of the casualties among the troops at yesterday's fight as follows: "Captain Wallace, twenty five men of the Seventh cavalry, and one Indian scout killed."

Gaslighting Did It.

COULDER, CITY, Wash, Dec. 30.—Walter B. Webb, who was cashier of the Northern Pacific Express Company, at Spokane Falls, from May, 1889, until last Sunday, committed suicide here this evening by shooting himself through the head. He came from Spokane Falls last night and played stud poker in Bisbee Bros' saloon till morning, losing all the money he had. This afternoon he began playing again on borrowed capital and lost 40 in two hours. At 8:30 he rose from the card table, asked for the key to the water-closet and walked out. In less than a minute from the time he left the saloon a pistol report was heard and the dead body of Webb was found in the closet, lying in a pool of blood.

A Very old Man.

EUGENE, Dec. 30.—Mr Jacob Spores, who was probably the oldest man in Lane county, if not the oldest in the state, was buried today. He was highly respected by all who knew him, and leaves a large family of children and grandchildren. He came across the plains to Oregon in 1847 and settled on a donation land claim near the McKenzie river, five miles from Eugene, where he resided until his death. He was 96 years of age, and has been almost totally blind for several years.

A Man Murdered

FRENDETON, Dec. 30.—Sunday afternoon Joe Latocine, while hunting a mare at a point one mile and a half above Cuyse station, frightened some magpies, which flew from the brush below a rocky grade. The incident aroused his curiosity, and when he went down to investigate he was horrified by the discovery of a man's body and immediately went to Cuyse, where he notified the section men.

The man's name is Henry A. Brown. From the condition of the body it is judged that the deed was committed four or five days ago. A club was found on the track and it is thought the wound on his head was inflicted by this.
