M. E. CHURCH DEDICATED.

Sunday was a great day in the history of the M. E. Church, of Albany. The new church was then occupied for the first time. Both morning and evening it was crowded with citizens of Albany, who united in pronouncing it an elegant structure, and an ornament to the city. Six or seven hundred were present on each occasion, the actual seating capacity being about six hundred. The auditorium seats about 400 and each of the three classrooms 50 to 70. The interior is beautifully finished in sugar pine, set off by mahogany wood, with intersections of frescoed ceiling. A handsome electric chandelier and pendants furnish the lights. The seats of sugar pine are nicely cushioned and the floor handsomely carpeted. There is not a prettier or more conveniently arranged church edifice in the state.

In the morning Rev J. W. Bushong, D. D., preached a powerful sermon on "Spirit Over Church Work." Rev S. E. Aldinger, pastor of the church, made a statement showing the cost of the church to be \$9434. Of this amount \$4934 had previously been subscribed, and \$1500 provided for by the church extension fund, leaving \$3000 to raise. Of this amount \$3000 was subscribed in the morning and over \$400 at night, leaving about \$300 to raise. Mr. Jas. Elkins, who had already subscribed \$500, headed the list with \$250, and was followed by George Hochstetler, G. L. Blackman and a friend with the same amount. John Geisendorfer, G. F. Simpson, B. M. Huston, F. H. Roscoe and a friend each put down \$100; Collins Elkins, Ralph Ohlberg, Joe Chamberlain, S. S. Underwood, Robert Conn, Mrs. Coll Van Cleve, Coll Van Cleve, S. A. Hullin, Perry Conn, F. E. Allen, Peter C. Anderson, U. F. Hadley and a friend \$50 each; I. G. Hayne, \$35; J. B. Conn, \$30; A. J. Hamilton, J. L. Cowan, Mary Conn, Anna Babbington, Mrs. Geo. Hochstetler, Frank Cline, J. A. McFerson, Emma Coughlin, W. R. Graham, John Robison, F. S. Crosby, M. J. Anderson, Mrs. G. F. Simpson, A. Settemier and two friends, each \$25. Others gave smaller amounts, and most of the above had already subscribed liberally on the original subscription.

Rev C. C. Stratton's sermon in the evening was a bright effort greatly appreciated. Excellent music was furnished by a choir, sitting to the left of the pulpit. The church was formally dedicated under charge of Rev S. P. Wilson, Presiding Elder.

BRIDGES GENERALLY.

Having been visiting Lane county, I thought I would have to say a few words about that county. I found everything in the way of business moving right along. The city of Eugene is a nice little place. Many nice cottages going up. They claim it a little dull, but it seemed to me that it was quite lively.

They have rather a poor court house, but I talked with some of the leading men and they said they could do with the court house, but could not do without the bridges.

I took a day and visited the Springfield bridge. It is a fine bridge; built of steel and iron. It is a 400 span built upon a solid stone foundation. It is not half iron and half wood. I think if our county officials would visit that bridge they would be convinced that the cement piers ought to be put under a bridge like the Jefferson and Brownville bridges.

Now when Albany takes hold to build her bridge, I do hope she will not allow any pile piers, but go to the bottom and put in rock piers. I do not see why Albany and Lane county can't have a bridge when Lane county can build such a bridge without the aid of a city.

I hope that we will see a fine bridge span the river at Albany. Rake the moss off the backs of the officials and begin in time. I know that there will be lots of mossbacks in the country, say: "O that we don't do us any good!" But I say it will. I live in the country and I say as Albany helps us build our bridges, we should help build the bridge at that place. I know we have suffered with floods, but we have the breaks repaired. Do it up right and have no trouble.

The Springfield bridge I believe cost \$35,000. If the bridge at Albany costs \$75,000, we are better able to pay it than Lane is to build all her bridges. I say it is high time that Albany should wake up and say, a bridge we must have, and a bridge we will have.
