LOCAL RECORD.

The Lebanon Election.—A very hotly contested election occurred in Lebanon yesterday. The saloon license there was recently raised to \$1200, resulting in high and low license being the principal issue. Jos Nixon, low license, was defeated by J. A. Beard, who received a majority. Walter C. Peterson was elected Recorder, defeating J. W. Meuzies; Steve Coyle, Marshal, defeating Ernest Case; J. A. Roberts, Treasurer, without opposition. G. W. Cronson, Jos Elkins and Milt Westfall for Councilmen, were on the two principal tickets and were elected. A warm fight was made between R. N. Wright, high license, and Jas. Matlock, medium license, the latter being elected Councilman by a small majority. A majority of the new council, it is probable, will be in favor of a medium license, somewhat smaller than the present very high license. 180 votes were cast, and could the residents of the suburbs, really a part of the city, but not yet included in the charter, have voted, the total would have been above 200.
