State Temperance Alliance.

The executive committee of the Oregon State Temperance Alliance met at the Y M C A rooms in Portland, Jan 5th, and formulated the following official call for the next session of the Alliance.

The basis of representation is set forth in Article 2 of the constitution, which reads as follows: "Membership.—The Alliance shall be composed of delegates representing churches, Sunday schools, and temperance organizations. Each such society within the state shall be allowed one delegate for each fifty members or major portion thereof; and all life members hitherto known as such shall be recognized as members."
