The legislature of South Dakota will hold for United States Senator Jan. 20.

Gov. Russell, of Massachusetts, (dem.) recommends the repeal of the law requiring payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting.

Senator Quay has introduced a new force bill. It confers upon the president the power to suspend the writ of habeas corpus when it is necessary to elect the republican ticket. It's a dead duck.

The Oregonian is spending a great deal of time and space in discussing democratic candidates for the presidency. The chaotic condition of the republican party seems to render all discussion of republican candidates unnecessary. It is highly probable that the national democratic convention will select a candidate without reference to what that paper may say.

A writer in science says that while as yet we have discovered no way of avoiding contagion which comes to us in the air, we are just beginning to find out the extremely important fact that the air does not become contaminated with bacteria unless they are allowed to dry. Recent investigations, he adds, have shown a smaller number of bacteria in the air of a well-kept sewer than in that of a poorly ventilated school-room.

Day by day evidence accumulates that "a combine" is to be formed among those who want large appropriations by the legislature. In southern, eastern and western Oregon large sums will be asked for to build wagon roads. They will combine with others wanting appropriations for other purposes. The tax payers should be on the alert.

If congress should pass a free silver coinage bill it would be the means of placing Harrison between the "evil one" and the deep blue sea. Whatever course he may pursue it will most certainly defeat him for renomination. If he vetoes the bill the west will have no more use for him, and if he approves it the east will cast him off. Query: May not Reed let the bill pass the house for the purpose of putting Harrison in a hole? Reed hates Harrison as he does Blaine.

The matter of the state going into the business of publishing school books will, we are told, be brought before the legislature at this session. That the supply of school books is a monopoly, caused by the states adopting a uniform series of books. This is not entirely true. School books are copy-righted and no one can publish them but the legal owner of the copyright. The right itself is an exclusive one and, therefore, a monopoly. The establishment of a well equipped plant for publishing a full line of school text books is a large undertaking. It is estimated that such a plant, including all the material as type, cuts etc. would cost not less than \$175,000. Men experienced in this business should be consulted before taking this important step.

BEARDING THE LION IN HIS DEN. The Behring Sea sealeries controversy came up in the United States supreme court Monday, on a motion which has in view a judicial determination of the dispute between the United States and Great Britain over the seal fisheries. Joseph Choate, in behalf of Thomas Henry Cooper, owner and claimant of the British schooner Hayward, which was seized in the waters of Behring sea by the revenue cutter Rush, has petitioned the court for a writ of prohibition to be directed to the judge of the district court of the United States in and for the territory of Alaska, restraining him from proceeding with the condemnation and sale of the vessel. The object is to have the court take up and pass upon the question of jurisdiction over these waters. The chief justice made an order giving the attorney-general two weeks to file an answer to the brief of Choate, giving reasons why the petition should not be granted.
