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LOCAL RECORD.

THE VETERAN OF 1812, for the benefit of the G. A. R., was given last evening at the opera house to a good-sized audience who were much pleased at the fine manner in which it was presented. The cast of characters had been considerably changed from that of a year ago, if anything to the play's improvement. J. R. Wyatt did the part of the Veteran with good effect. S. W. Reese sustained his former splendid reputation as Bill Jones, a part for which he is peculiarly well fitted. He was sustained in splendid form by Jennie A. Clayton, as Kessiah Weatherly, his sweetheart. Geo. Fish, now of Corvallis, did the villain, Jim Haines, well, as did Mr. Wallace Baldwin the part of Sheriff Shanon. The sheriff was completely backed by a company of thoroughly equipped bushwhackers. The parts of the darker slaves were likewise sustained to the entire satisfaction of the audience. R. Fox, as old Zibe, and W. W. Macoon, as Pete, were in the right notes. B. F. Tabler, as Capt. Hardy, R. B. Vunk, as Jake Whiteaker, J. F. Whitling, as Corporal Mason, and Mrs. H. C. Harkness, as Mary Morrison came up to the spirit of the play. Several beautiful tableaux were presented at intervals.

THE PLAY will be repeated tonight for the general admission of 25 cents, and deserves a large audience.

A BIG SUIT.—During the past two years Markley & Dunstan, professional abstracters from the East, have been making a complete abstract of the titles of Benton county, at Corvallis, and perfecting the titles generally, the books having been in rather of a bad shape. At the last term of the County Court, having completed their work, they presented their bill, which figured up \$7200. Now comes Judge Burnett and brings a suit against the County Judge and Commissioners, and County Treasurer, enjoining them from paying the county warrants, which had been issued in favor of Markley and Dunstan. The complaint alleges that the whole transaction was unconstitutional and that said sum was more than the work performed was worth and the county commissioners had no right to enter into such contract under the present laws of the state. The case is an important one and will be watched with great interest.

AN EXAMPLE.—Eugene has set a good example for other cities, as well as for counties generally.

Mr. E. Stewart refuses to pay city taxes on his land that lies within the city limits, and three years taxes have accumulated against the property amounting to \$273.56. Wednesday the marshal commenced proceedings to enforce payment by levy and sale. It is expected that Mr. Stewart will resist and it will probably require the supreme court to decide whether or not taxes can be collected from property that has been made valuable by the town.—Guard.

ONLY SEVEN LEFT.—It has been over two months since the overland passenger train was wrecked at LaBish, more or less painfully injuring 150 passengers. Today, aside from the resident victims of the wreck, there remain in Salem but seven of the unfortunate who were aboard the ill-fated train. These are: Dr. and Mrs. Hamnill, of Philadelphia, both of whom sustained back and spinal injuries; Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Kimberley, of Neenah, Wis., both injured in the back and the former's leg paralyzed; Mrs. W. Hewitt, Menasha, Wis., wrist fractured; J. S. Bartholomew, Boston, back injured; W. A. Creek, from near Grand Junction, Col., leg broken.—Statesman.
