A STARTLING AFFAIR.—We learn that the citizens of Forest Grove are considerably stirred up over recent developments in that city, wherein certain prominent citizens have been violating the liquor law, says the West Side.

The Grove is a prohibition town. No saloons are allowed within its corporate limits—only a drug store or two with exclusive authority to slack the thirst of the initiated. The story goes this way: For some time there has been evidence of illegitimate sale of liquor going on, so the "law and order party" had a detective put on the trail of the offenders, and pretty soon quite a large "mare's nest" was unearthed. It was discovered that a leading physician, a druggist and two drug store clerks, were the offenders.
