SALEM.

SALEM, Jan. 24, 1891.

The legislature has adjourned until Monday. From this on we may expect much that will interest the public. In these last days there is so much human nature in the ministerial makeup in some of the denominations that scoffers multiply rapidly. This is to be lamented. When all respect is lost for the "cloth," caused by its own bad conduct, the ordinary sinner blushes with shame. The row in Sweet Home valley, in a church there, is far worse on the good order of society than a Dempsey defeat. In this case in Sweet Home there is no Christian conduct exhibited, and when the opportunity offered to exhibit in practice, what these devotees of religion professed, they ignored the true spirit and showed that which would better become Arabs.

On the other hand we have another exhibition of worldly disposition though solemnized by prayer. For a long time there has been an element of the M. E. church working to remove the Willamette university, of Salem, to Portland. Through the pluck and energy of Salem trustees the scheme failed. There were legal obstacles in the way of its success, and the unsophisticated "traveller" thought the "outrage" had passed out. But, no, there appears in the house a bill, No. 30, to give to three-fourths of the members present of an incorporated religious, benevolent, literary or charitable society, or any society having for its object the development of the physical or mental capacities of its members, power to file supplementary articles of incorporation, whenever needed to further schemes. The scheme here is believed to be the final removal of the Willamette university to Portland if such a vote can be had. All this is easily read between the lines of the bill. Though the bill was introduced in the house it was evidently prepared by one of the trustees of the university, a resident of Portland, but who was educated in this university, and got his start in Salem. It will not do to antagonize the old Salem university with the contemplated Portland university, in the same church, hence this supposed scheme to capture the old Willamette.

There has been a bitter row over this question in words that has a parallel in the legislature over in Washington; though none have gone so far as to have "been baptised with wine." What are we coming to when legislative bodies become disgraceful and religious bodies lose their self-respect. Even a member of the Washington legislature refuses to sit in an opera house beside a negro, and the latter sat down so hard that the sensitive law-maker could not move him. In these degenerate days it becomes the rank and file in the private station, regarded by Addison as the post of honor, to do the blushing if they cannot do the preaching and law-making.

Fullerton offered a joint memorial to congress asking for an appropriation to survey the public lands of Oregon. It is humiliating to think that this is necessary, but when the fact is known that of the \$100,000 appropriated for surveys in Oregon and Washington last session, only \$20,000 was by the department allowed for Oregon, and \$80,000 for our daughter, we feel we are neglected. This is due to the wonderful generosity of Mr. Hermann, who has since been reminded that \$20,000 will not complete the public surveys of Douglas county, where he resides when at home. A fly leaf of a small primer would contain the whole sum of his official acts, while it would take a balloon of the greatest capacity to hold the gas expended on the contents of the fly leaf of this little treasure by this "Soporose" headed delegate to the Reed circles at the national capitol.

A bill to purchase the locks has been introduced in the house. The state should own these locks, but as there are now rival railroads on either side of them, and as no considerable amount of revenue is derived from them, the amount to be paid for them should be small. All there is in the state owning them is to have the natural water highway of the valley forever free from the control of private fortunes, or locked up by rival interests in corporate capacity.

CIRCULATING LIBRARY.—Mr Joe Tall, who organized a circulating library a year ago, and placed 100 books at the store of C. E.
