The sole county, as a unit, is interested in a matter, and the request of one section of a county, state or nation to be made a state one is no reason why it should. The move at this time is an unfortunate one, started from an entirely mistaken knowledge of facts, and the arguments used are based on unreliable facts.

ROSEBURG'S B. & L. A.—The annual meeting of the Roseburg Building & Loan Association was held last Monday. Two amendments were made to the by laws, raising the secretary's salary to \$10 month and the other requiring the borrower to give bonds to the amount of \$50. From the report of Secretary Benson, for the year 1890, the following are taken: Total number of shares sold, 428; total number of loans, 25; total amount of loans, \$12,400; total amount repaid loans, 300; highest number of months' interest bid, 26; lowest number of months' interest bid, 14; average, 23; present value of cash share, \$70. This report shows the association to be in a healthy, flourishing condition.—Review.

STATE LEGISLATURE.

SALEM, Jan. 26.—Following are among the most important new bills introduced. Amending the laws in reference to the State board of agriculture; incorporating Lebanon and other cities; protecting fish; amending assessment law; against strikes and intimidation; improving the Willamette; for divorce trials by jury; for rogues gallery; repealing Chinese pleasure law; abolishing the horticultural commission. A joint memorial for \$100,000 for improvement of the Willamette was ordered printed. An expert for examining the Agricultural College affairs was ordered. Durham, Shedd and Tracy were appointed committee on Militia affairs. A large number of bills were read the second time.

A sad occurrence was witnessed on Lower Trout on Thursday last week at the residence of Mr Linville, in which a little daughter, of Mr and Mrs Linville, about four years of age, lost her life. Mrs Linville had left two children, aged two and four years respectively, in the house while she was attending to some work outside the house. During her absence the smaller of the children was playing with a fire poker and with it ignited the clothes of the four year old girl, and before Mrs Linville arrived and put out the flames the little girl was so badly burned that she died from her injuries the following day.—Prineville papers.

The Oregonian thus pointedly gets down to business on the division question: Unatilla county is not the only one this year in which a certain portion of the inhabitants are desirous of seceding and settling up a county government of their own. Linn county is having trouble of a similar nature. A lot of disgruntled politicians in the neighborhood of Brownsville and Seio have been going around circulating stories calculated to make the people in the eastern end of the county dissatisfied with the present county government. The idea is to split Linn county directly through the center, making the South Santiam river the dividing line. The county seat of the new county would be Seio. The movement had greater strength when first started than it now has. Misrepresentations were made to the farmers that Linn county was about to build a bridge across the Willamette that would benefit only the people of Albany, and also that they were about to build a new court house. These statements are wholly without foundation.

The courthouse, although an old one, is quite adequate to the needs of the county, and probably will be for some years to come. The bridge across the Willamette will be built by the citizens of Albany, who are now asking the legislature to amend their charter so that they may issue bonds for that purpose. These facts are now better known and the movement for county division is on the wane. Senator Myers, being from Seio, favors division, but the other members of the Linn county delegation are all opposed to it.
