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COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Tuesday evening, Jan. 27th, 1891. Present—Mayor, Recorder, Marshal, Street Commissioner and Councilmen.

The following bills were ordered paid: John Hoffman, \$37.10; Deyoe & Froman Bros, \$12.32; John Cleland, \$4; J H Davis, \$2; G L Savage, \$4; George Hughes, \$1; Stites & Nutting, \$12.50; Sloan & Warner, \$2; P C Anderson, \$6; Arch Blackburn, \$2.20; Mrs A Blackburn, \$2.20; Earl Race, \$5; Santiam Lumber Co, \$18.17; P Cohen, \$9.50; W B Candiff, \$4; L Gottlieb, \$5; R B Yunk, \$6; John Chiswell, \$5; F Bender, \$1.50; R Brown, \$9; O P Danna, \$1.70; J W Givin & Co, \$4.5; John Maxwell, \$22.05; W Miller, \$70; John Jones, \$70; W A McClain, \$50; A J Hunt, \$47.75.

Bill of J A Warner, \$56, reduced to \$11 and allowed; bill of John Schmeier continued.

The committee on Fire and Water reported in favor of certain precautionary improvements at houses of Chinese Jo and Hong Wa Chung, and that engine houses and apparatus were found in good condition except engine house of No 2, which should be cleaned. Adopted.

A wheelbarrow was ordered purchased for the city.

The Street Commissioner reported property in his possession as street commissioner, consisting of scraper, lumber, etc.

Petition of C E Brownell and others asked for privilege of laying water pipes along Ferry Street to southern boundary of city to be furnished with water by force pump to be maintained at expense of petitioners. Referred.

Licenses were granted John Giblin and Huffman & Taylor to sell liquor.

Bid for boarding city prisoners was read, as follows: J N Hoffman, 25 cents per meal. On motion accepted.

Bids for lumber were read as follows: Green Basin Lumber Co, \$9.00 per thousand on cars at Albany, and \$9.40 unloaded; Santiam Lumbering Co, \$10.00 per car load on board cars at Albany; Alfred Wheeler, \$10.00 per thousand on board cars at Albany. Contract was let to the Green Basin Lumbering Co at \$9.40, to be unloaded where designated.

The following bids for gravel and dirt were read: B F Stewart, 60 cts per yard for pit gravel; A B Morris, Calapooia gravel 70 cts, city gravel 58 cts, gravel across the river \$1.04; J Whiteside, river gravel 98 cts, pit gravel 64 cts, dirt 24 cts; Livingstone & Lear, river gravel \$1, pit gravel 63 cts, dirt 23 cts; N E Steel, river gravel 95 cts, pit gravel 63 cts, dirt 24 cts; Mike Cowan, river gravel 90 cts, pit gravel 59 cts, dirt 22 cts. Contract was let to Mike Cowan.

Bids for building lateral sewers connecting with R R sewer were read as follows: Jas Laurent, 78 cents per foot; Geo W Hughes, 90 cts per foot between First and Water and others \$1.20; Mason & Strang, 74 cents to 79 cents. On motion the contract was let to Mason & Strang, their average bid being 77.18-29 per foot, the matter being left to the committee on streets and public property with power to act, contract to be signed in three days, bonds to be \$1500.

Contract for doing city printing was let to Stites & Nutting at 23 cents per inch per insertion. Bid of Herald 25 cents. Contract for printing posters was let to C W Watts at 25 cents per lot.

Resignation of W N Miller as engineer and night watchman was accepted. The Chief Engineer was directed to secure an engineer until next meeting.
