LOCAL RECORD.

Oct \$100.—Not long since a couple of fellows came to this city for the purpose of selling organs, four of which were at the S.P. depot; but the freight had not been paid on them, and the parties not having the money, an accommodating drayman paid the freight charges, which amounted to but little, and loaned the organs to the dealers \$20 besides; but kept the instruments in his possession. The dealers in music then gave Mr. Harness, who lives near Corvallis, a bill of sale of the organs as security on a loan of \$100, and we learn, have skipped out. Wiley B. Allen, of Portland, to whom the instruments belong, having heard that something was wrong, sent a representative, who was in the city Wednesday, and after paying the drayman the freight charges and his \$20, shipped the organs to Portland. It now looks as if Mr. Harness is out \$100, though we cannot say what the result may be.—Benton Leader.

The question to every property holder and business man of Albany, is, would it be to our interests to have the county divided. I answer it would not. It is more to our advantage to build up Albany by drawing it from all the territory possible, instead of cutting off a portion of that, which by industry and perseverance, we have already acquired. Let us endeavor to add to our prosperity instead of detracting from it by lending a helping hand to build up a rival town within twelve miles of us, and that is what it will virtually result in should the county be divided as proposed.

Hosea Brown, of Sinslaw precinct, has been granted a pension of \$45 per month during his lifetime. This will be good news for the old veteran of the war of 1812, who is in his ninety-ninth year, and is quite poor. He resides with a son who is 78 years of age.—Guard.

Jack Wilkes, who is an agent for a benevolence and insurance company, of California, was arrested in this city yesterday for violating the laws of Oregon relating to insurance companies doing business in this state.—Journal. It will do no harm to keep an eye out for these fellows in Albany.

At a meeting of grangers at Salem a resolution was passed against granting any more appropriations to the Agricultural College until the title to the land is secured to the state, and demanding an investigation of how the previous money granted has been used. A very good idea.

THE DEMOCRAT is informed that the Street Railway Company has received a proposition from citizens in the East end of the city to build a track ready for use and convey it to the company provided it be operated regularly. It should by all means be accepted. Though a private corporation street car companies should be run in the interest of the whole city regardless of locality. We are glad to know the prospect is good for a line into the Goltra Park Addition. Let us have them in all directions.

The papers in the case of M. A. Moody, plaintiff, against George W. Rowland, H. C. Nelson, W. M. Stewart, George A. Liebe, Thomas N. Joles, Isaac P. Jones, C. M. Dietzel, Leslie Butler and E. B. McFarland, were served on the defendants yesterday evening. The suit is brought to recover the sum of \$50,000, Mr. Moody alleging that the defendants had slandered him to that extent in signing and presenting to the city council and causing to be published a statement concerning his possession of the water of Dallas City, said statement being the matter over which impeachment proceedings were instituted. W. Lair Hill, Bellinger, Dolph and Simon appear for the plaintiff.—Dallas Chronicle.

The Oregonian legislative editor continues to talk in a sensible manner. He says: "Santiam county is not likely to be created this year out of Linn county. Senator Jeff Myers, of Scio, who was reported to be in favor of dividing the old county, has come out in strong opposition, although assured by real estate boomers that it would be \$10,000 in his pocket from the increased value of real estate when Scio should be made the county seat. No one of the two senators or three representatives from Linn county will consent to introduce a bill prepared by them to divide the county from the forks of the Santiam, which is the best man evidence of the weakness of the movement in favor of county division. There are over 4000 voters in Linn county, and only about 600 names are signed to the petition for division. The taxes collected in Linn county amount to \$137,000, and the section which wishes to have a county all by itself pays less than \$1200 of this sum. The expense of a county government, including school taxes, would be twice the sum now paid by them at a low estimate. During the past two years Linn county has paid out for bridges in the section that wishes to secede over \$38,000. It would seem from the foregoing figures that there are about 600 people in the forks of the Santiam who do not know when they are well off.

Why He Signed It.

FORKS SANTIAM, Jan. 30th, 1891.

Editors Democrat: I want to say a few things about county division and the means used to secure signers to the petition. I signed the petition because the man who asked me to do so told me that Albany was now demanding \$180,000 for a new court house, \$60,000 for a new jail and \$60,000 for a bridge. Other persons signed the petition because they were told that the south part of the county was taking steps to draw off and that unless we went now we would never get off. These stories I am told were used all over the Forks to get signers. Now the taxpayers have found this out and in a few days the Legislature will hear from the Forks again, but this time in the shape of remonstrances that will satisfy everybody that we are opposed to division. STATE LEGISLATURE.

SALEM, Jan. 30.—Minto's World's Fair bill provides, that for the purpose of defraying the expenses incurred by the state board of commissioners appointed under the act, that there is hereby appropriated \$50,000; \$10,000 to be expended in 1891, \$20,000 in 1892 and \$20,000 in 1893. Weatherford has introduced a bill incorporating North Brownsville, Norval, protecting Chinese pheasants and other birds east of the Cascades; Weatherford, providing for the payment of interest on orders. By representative Miller, of Josephine county, petition asking for Santiam county; by McCracken, to protect wagon roads, forbidding wagons with tire less than three inches wide with load of over two thousand pounds, to be driven over wagon roads; by Shedd, relating to duties of county clerks and assessors. By Minto, to repeal law which forbids persons bribed from testifying against those bribing. By Shedd, relating to records of mortgages.

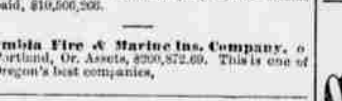

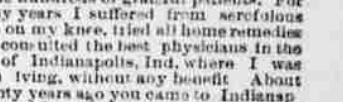
