A CONGRESS OF JOBS.

Ex Lieutenant Governor C F Black, the Washington correspondent of the New York World sizes up this congress as follows:

Is this congress to be given over bodily to jobs? It is apparently inclined to consider nothing else.

The Force bill is a gigantic political job, designed to turn the conduct and control of elections over to a corrupt partisan machine, to be maintained out of taxes cruelly extorted from the people under monopoly laws. The magnitude of this job exceeds anything in the history of American politics, since it is to be not only a continuing but a self-perpetuating job. It will take, if passed, many millions from the treasury. No federalist villainy is ever perfect unless it robs the toiling people to pauper loafing tax-eaters. It is upon tax consumption that the party exists always did and always must exist.

The ship-subsidy bill is another and a pure job. Nobody can guess how many millions of public money it would transfer to private pockets in the nineteen years during which it lays the treasury open to the already rich and sturdy grabbers for whose benefit it is designed. The more ships are built to secure the bounty the greater will be the plunder; and when it shall be proposed to repeal the law and relieve the people of a monstrous burden, the powerful beggars of to-day—the opulent steamship companies whose agents crowd the lobby—will plead vested rights, the sanctity of contracts and all the familiar arguments of the land-grant and subsidized railroads.

There, too, is the silver bill. Whatever may be said for free silver, it cannot be said that the legislature in progress is untainted. If so, why the reluctance of the managers to permit an investigation of the silver pool? Why the cautions, timidity of the committee at last to investigate? Thus far, it is true, only one senator has been exposed speculating in the article whose market value was immediately affected by his vote. But disclosures of this are slow. The testimony must usually be that of accomplices. It is hard to get, and partial when it comes. It was not until Oakes Ames was goaded into telling the whole truth by the unmanly falsehoods of his confederates that the Credit Mobilier exposures developed in all its proper and shocking proportions. All that is behind this silver cloud will probably never be known. Enough appears already, however, to justify the constant demand *The World* made for the inquiry which the republican managers vainly endeavored to prevent.

The jobs—Force bill, silver speculation, subsidy mongering—take the right of way in the tax-raising and tax spending monopoly congress. The public business may wait or find consideration in the hurry and tumble of the concluding hours, when the smaller but not more indecent steals attached to appropriation bills may slide through, observed only by those who favor them.

Of one thing the insolent majority has made sure; it has by its own conduct vindicated the good sense of the people who voted it down and out in November last. How different this federalist plan of government—taxing the many poor to make a few rich—from the democratic ideal sketched by Jefferson: "A wise and frugal government, which shall restrain men from injuring one another, shall leave them otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of labor the bread it has earned!"

The New York World says that the worst thing about Cameron's silver speculation is that he is not ashamed of it. It will strike many that this is a peculiarity of Cameron's political existence. Pessimists have a strong argument in the fact that neither Cameron nor his party has exhibited shame at his prominence in his public life.

Business men of Albany are very seriously considering how much the business interests of Albany may be injured by the division of the county. It would be well to look into the future a little.
