If we had more money in the state, and more people with it, our citizens would be able to build their own roads and not call on the state to do it. Half of the money expended by the state in such ways is as bad as stolen.

Some uneasiness has been occasioned among their friends here by the singular disappearance of Mr and Mrs Charles Genevieve. They left their home in Pendleton one Sunday evening nearly a month ago. Mr Genevieve stating that they intended to return on the Tuesday following. They were going to Wallula, he said, after the sister of their adopted son, Joseph, whose tragic death at the hands of Charles Bense is well remembered. The girl would be brought by them to Pendleton. Since their departure not the least information has been received as to their whereabouts. The East Oregonian's exchanges are asked to mention Mr and Mrs Genevieve's disappearance, in order that the mystery may be cleared up if possible.—E. O.

Harry W Walters, a former saloon keeper of Albany, is now in the same business in Pendleton, where they have been having a big time making arrests for selling liquor to minors. It being reported that the saloon men would boycott all new enterprises Walters published the following in the E. O.: "Without wishing to bear all egotistical I may inform you that it has always been my aim to be among the first to contribute my mite towards any scheme to further the welfare and prosperity of the town in which I live. While in Spokane Falls I was among the first to give my mite toward bringing the S. & L. railroad there; also while living at Grant's Pass, I identified myself with that town by taking \$250 worth of opera house stock, and I expect to do all I can for the proposed improvements here. I cannot believe that any right-minded man would be so foolish as to do anything to obstruct an enterprise which would prove as advantageous to himself as the one proposed."

STATE LEGISLATURE.

The assessment law will provide for deduction on real estate only. The bill for the repeal of the railroad commission was defeated in the senate, 15 to 13. Weatherford and Myers of course voting in favor of the repeal. Thomas' bill to repeal the usury law was defeated in the house, 16 to 38. Senator Fulton's bill intended to encourage railroad building in the state by providing that the state make contracts with new railroads for the transportation of the militia, convicts and insane persons, at an annual sum equal to the amount of taxes which the road is to pay, passed the senate with only four opposing votes.

In the senate: Blackman's bill, regulating the salaries of county judges, passed.

Willis' bill, regulating the rights and duties of employers and employees, passed.

Fulton's bill, protecting salmon and other fish, passed.

Gates' bill, regulating the salaries of county treasurers, passed.

Fulton's bill, for a code of civil procedure, referred.

Matlock's bill, amending the law regulating the state board of Agricultural Society, passed.

Raley's bill, regarding the destruction of wild animals and their bounties, passed.

Bills in the house were introduced extending Salem's city limits and giving the city authority to remove awnings, etc. The bill for a \$1000 library at the penitentiary, passed.

Welch's bill, allowing liquor licenses for no shorter time than one year, failed to pass.

Garfield's bill, to compel prompt payment of laborers, passed.

Jenning's bill, amending the school law passed.

Homes' bill, prohibiting certain persons from marrying, including deaf and blind people, lost, 12 to 38.

Wood's bill, to pay jurors \$3 instead of \$2 a day, failed to pass.

Hall's bill, allowing county courts to establish the lines of and number of justice precincts, passed.

Barrett's bill, allowing courts to assess damages in certain cases, passed.

Holmes' bill for justice trials where defendants reside, passed.
