LOCAL RECORD.

LEBANON is the terminus of a branch of the S P from Albany, from which place it is about twelve miles distant. The train makes two round trips between this place and Albany daily, and has considerable passenger travel. The past year has been one of remarkable growth and development for Lebanon. Over one hundred new buildings have been erected since January 1, 1890. Among them being some handsome residences, which would be a credit to any city. The large influx of strangers from eastern states, has served to stimulate this growth, though the fine agricultural land on all sides of Lebanon, is a sufficient stimulus to a healthy growth. Many of the residences recently erected, are the property of substantial farmers, who have moved to town.—Cor. Salem Journal.

GOOD R. R. NEWS.—A year or two ago Crook county people got their Oregon Pacific news from Albany. Now matters have been reversed and Albany people get their Oregon Pacific news from Prineville, and here is some from the News worth reciting: "A prominent business man in town informs us that he has received a personal communication from Col. Hogg, receiver of the Oregon Pacific railroad, in which he states that there are now 20,000 tons of rails on the way to Yaquina; that preparations are being made to let the contracts for sawing and cutting 50,000 ties, and that active operations will commence on the eastern extension of the road as soon as snow flies."

STATE LEGISLATURE.

SALEM, Feb. 9.—Blundell introduced the usual bill in the House for the publication of school books by the State. The Senate bill on primaries passed 50 to 2. Miller's freight bill passed 49 to 4. Bill for state medical board homeopathic and eclectic passed. Bill of Miller, increasing powers of the railroad commission, passed. The fish bill passed over the Governor's veto, 37 to 16. The bill providing for licenses for 1 year was reconsidered and passed 57 to 14. Bill for portage railway at Celilo, appropriating \$400,000, passed the Senate 18 to 8. Norval's bill, protecting Chinese pheasants, prairie chicken and quail in Eastern Oregon passed in the Senate. Hon. J. K. Weatherford voted against the \$400,000 and Hon. Jeff Myers for it. The Portland consolidation bill is liable to fail. Senator Crouch introduced a bill, the effect of which will be to take from the governor the control of the penitentiary. The bill provides that the governor, secretary of state and the state treasurer shall constitute a board of trustees for the management of the penitentiary. They will appoint the superintendent, who is now appointed by the governor. If this bill passes, it is believed the term of the present superintendent, George Downing, will quickly terminate.

Y. M. C. A. Notes.

The ladies of Albany who are interested in the work of the Young Men's Christian Association will hold a meeting at the Y M C A hall, on Friday evening, at 7:30 o'clock, for the purpose of organizing a Ladies Auxiliary to the Young Men's Christian Association of Albany, and it is earnestly desired that there will be a large number in attendance. We believe there is a large field for an organization of this kind to work in, and while we realize the fact that church work calls largely upon the time of the ladies, yet we feel that this branch of the work will be successful, because its members will be composed largely of ladies that are thus busily engaged.
