HIS SENTIMENTS.—The Corvallis Times man says the following, which were the closing sentences in a sermon by Dr. Thompson, are his sentiments, a pretty good admission for Bob to make, and we are glad to know that he possesses as much religion as is displayed in the words used: "I want for our youth a Christianity that shall not relax one iota of its obligation to God or to man; that shall not baffle one jot from an entire consecration of heart and life to God; that shall walk closely with God, and feel deeply as human weakness can feel the need of watchfulness and of divine care to keep it from temptation. I want more joy brought out of the world by Christians. I want the pleasures of youth carried into the pleasures of old age. I want the principles of the gospel and the gospel carried into the pleasures of youth. I do not plead for a lower but a higher Christian life—for a wider and more application of gospel principles. I want Christian conscience and Christian churches clothed with principles and not with dogmas. I want the word of God read and interpreted fairly, and those pleasures and recreations allowed which it allows. I protest against the bible being twisted and perverted into rules to abridge Christian liberty and repress innocent joy and forbid harmless pleasures. I want less of the religion that is 'dark as a funeral shroud from stern to stern' and more of that which is full of child-like trust in the love and light and joy of God. The angels haste with bounding step and notes of joy to do the Master's bidding. So let us mortals here below."

INDEFINITE POSTPONEMENT.—Quite a discussion has arisen as to the effect of the motion to indefinitely postpone the further consideration of the bill to create the county of Santiam, and the DEMOCRAT has been asked to explain the effect of such motion. The motion to indefinitely postpone, when carried in a deliberative assembly, has the effect to defeat the measure for that session. Such motion cannot be reconsidered, unless done on the same day. Roberts—in his Rules of Order—says, the effect of such motion is to entirely remove the question from before the assembly for that session. Speaking of the import of the word session, as used by him, he says, a session of an assembly is a meeting, though it may last for days, is virtually one meeting, as a session of a convention, or, even months as a session of congress. The session terminates by an adjournment without day. So it will be seen that this bill for the new county, cannot, under parliamentary rules, be called up again this session, if not done on the day of indefinite postponement.

BURGULARS AROUND.—While Mr and Mrs W F Hendrickson, residing on Broad-albin street, between Fifth and Sixth, were at church last evening a burglar entered their home and helped himself to a new suit of clothes belonging to Mr Hendrickson, a couple blankets, some silk handkerchiefs, other articles and about \$3 in money. Not leaving his card, and no one being seen around, no clue to his identity has been secured. The valley is being overrun with burglars and our citizens need to be on the watch.

FAST TIME.—A few days a special train passed through Albany from Dun-fuir, Cal. on its way to Portland. It contained the sick wife of a California senator, and gained six hours time on the regular train. The trip from Albany to Portland was made in less than two hours, at the rate 45 miles an hour, fast time for an Oregon road.

ANOTHER R. R.—The news in yesterday's Astorian of the filing in Salem of articles of incorporation to build a railroad from Portland to Astoria, was the subject of general comment. A variety of opinion was expressed. Further information elicited by wire yesterday was to the effect that it is "the true business."—Astorian.

Rev James Connelly, the Irish evangelist, arrived in the city this morning, and will begin a series of meetings this evening at the Methodist church.—The Dalles T. M. Rev Connelly recently assisted in the services at the M E Church in this city.

Tuesday evening several of the friends of Mrs John Briggs tendered her a surprise party in honor of her birthday. Several hours were passed at the pleasant home of Mr and Mrs Briggs, near the Calapooia, in games and sociability, and it was pronounced as enjoyable a party as they had had for a long time.

STATE LEGISLATURE.

SALEM, Feb 11.—Bill regulating salaries of treasurers passed the house. Henry's bill for \$5000 for a road up the Calapooia passed. Bill relating to dipping sheep passed. Bill creating Santiam county passed. Butler's bill for electing road supervisors passed. Several senate bills were read first time. Raley's irrigation bill passed and will become a law. Fulton's joint fish bill with Washington passed. Hirsch's bill for completion of the capital passed, 43 to 14. Watkins' portage railway bill passed.

In the senate, Waits bill authorizing a mother to appoint a guardian by will passed. Weatherford's bill to regulate foreign corporations, failed to pass; also Carson's bill for compulsory education of blind, deaf and mute. On motion of Weatherford the house bill creating Santiam county, was read and indefinitely postponed, which defeats it completely for the present session. Tongue's bill for the prevention of contagious diseases among animals, passed. Three senate road bills and nine house road bills passed the senate at an evening session.

The steam schooner Mischief, constructed here, owned by Winant & Buckley, and plying between this place and other points along the coast, is laid up here for repairs. She will be on the route again as soon as repaired.

Engineer G A Gyll is preparing to push the government works in the spring, when he will put on a large force of men. He now has about fifteen men at work on the jetty and about forty-five at the new quarry, under the superintendence of Joe Dougherty.

The steam schooner George H Chance, built at this place and owned by the Deep Sea Fishing Co., of Portland, and plying between Portland and Coos Bay, touched here last Tuesday to take passengers and freight en route from the Willamette valley to points between here and Coos Bay.—Cor. Statesman.

EUGENE.—Oregon can rightfully claim the youngest mayor in the person of the mayor of Fairmount, Lane county, who is only 22 years old.

The trial of G M Plaster for opening a letter belonging to other parties, was held at Portland last Friday. He plead guilty and was fined \$25, which he paid.

Starr & Griffin have received a car load of hardware direct from Pittsburg, Pa. It was probably the heaviest car load of freight ever received in this city, its weight being 43,215 pounds. The freight bill was \$635 25.—Register.

PACIFIC COAST HOPS.—In 1889 there were 3,665 acres planted in hops in Washington, which yielded 35,128 bales. In 1890 the acreage was increased to 4,538, and the product to 42,538 bales. In Oregon there were 16,908 bales produced, in 1889 and 28,130 bales in 1890. Each of these states show a handsome increase for the year 1890 over the preceding year. California's product for 1890 was less than for 1889, there being but 28,130 bales gathered as against 35,230 bales for the year before.

GETTING ECONOMICAL.—The Oregon Pacific under the management of Judge Denay is cutting down expenses in many different ways. Among others no special train will be run from the Bay with steamer passengers. Passengers will take the regular trains. The office of assistant manager and superintendent are merged, which accounts for Mr Dundan retiring. The general plan is economy, which is all right.

The county question has been settled for two years at least, and it is to be hoped for longer.

The city council at Junction has passed an ordinance requiring all dealers in cigarettes to pay a license of \$25 per annum and to furnish a \$250 bond that they will abide by the new law.

A live zephyr has been wafted northward today. Sometimes eastward, rattling signs and shaking trees; but compared to the Kansas cyclone it is hardly the breath of a consumptive.

It is estimated that the amount of money shipped out of the state for grain bags reached a million dollars for this year's crop. How much better it would have been to have saved the money in the county by starting a bag factory.

The sum of \$50,000 for Oregon's exhibit at the world's fair is large enough. It is too small for a set of schemers who started in with a purpose of personal profit, and they are woefully disappointed.—Statesman.

YAQUINA BAY.—Taking into consideration the preparations being made for, and the prospects of crowds of pleasure seekers, the government works, and the work on the railroad, there will be lively times here this summer.

The Junction Pilot is becoming quite a ladies' paper, most of the last issue being devoted to the gentle sex. It seems that some of the young ladies have been acting naughtily and the Pilot wanted to steer them into the right path, and they are mad, and he has had his hands full dodging epithets of vengeance.

A man about 60 years old has been playing the confidence game in the Palouse country lately. He wants to purchase a nice farm, and succeeds in getting a few days' board, and in one or two instances a small loan from the farmers with whom he talked.—Baker City Revelle. Probably the same man who has just worked Corvallis.

Most military companies in Oregon seem to be disturbed by internal dissensions. Albany's is an exception, only harmony prevailing. Eugene is now troubled. The Guard says: "A few days ago some of the members of C. O. N. G. of this city circulated a petition asking the captain to resign his office, being displeased with his management. Now the captain prefers charges against them and they will be called before the court of discipline."

Just to show how Providence gets in its fine work and preserves the town from destruction by fire during the Chinese New Year's celebration, a few figures are in order. There are 1,327 Chinese. Each one sets off 482 packs of crackers; that is 639,614 packs; in each pack there are 123 crackers; that makes 78,672,522 fire crackers that are being burned on the plank streets. Any one of the 78,672,522, if it got its work in, would start a blaze. Providence is on our side so far.—Astorian.

A peculiar accident recently happened to Wilbur Pentler, while skating at Dayton, Columbia county, Wash. He ran against a barbed wire that was stretched across the pond. It cut through his scarf and made a gash in his throat about four inches long. The wire gave away and wound around his neck, and it is thought that the breaking of the wire is all that saved his life. At present he is a seriously injured boy, but is on the road to recovery, says an Ex.

The attempt to create the county of Santiam from Linn was short-lived. The bill went through at the morning session on the argument of the lobbyists that it would take away so many democratic votes from Linn county, as to leave that county republican. The bill was no sooner read in the senate than it was indefinitely postponed, and will be heard of no more this session.—Oregonian. It is a fact worth noticing that the Senate as a rule takes a broader view of matters than the House.

Now for a bridge. Let there be no wavering. The good citizens of Albany will be solid for such a structure, which will do more for Albany than any other enterprise that can be named. We are far enough advanced now to do away with the primitive and backwoods style of crossing rivers on ill looking ferry boats, frontier affairs, and we are no longer a frontier.
