LOCAL RECORD.

A BURGULARY OUTFIT.—A day or two ago Isaac Beam found in his yard, in this city, a burglar's outfit, consisting of drills, etc., which had evidently been dropped in his yard by some one in a hurry, perhaps by the man who opened Fisher's safe at Corvallis. They are now in Marshal Hoffman's custody department. They indicate considerable use, and are made of the best material. The valley is filled with burglars and hard characters generally, and it is necessary to be on the outlook. Owing to vigilance of our marshal and police force Albany has less trouble than most of the valley towns.

STATE LEGISLATURE.

SALEM, Feb. 16.—Veatch's railroad commission bill postponed until 2 p m Tuesday. Minto's bill for fishway at Oregon City was referred. A few years ago Oregon had a fishway bill that proved all bill. The right kind of fishway, though, is needed. The senate concurred in memorial for improvement of mouth of Siuslaw, and resolutions of condolence over death of General Sherman. The matter of compiling Indian war records was referred. Raley's Sunday bill passed. A bill by Weatherford providing for a bing in smoke stacks of all river steamers was referred. The Portland consolidation bill passed, and will give general satisfaction through Oregon. Bills protecting German song birds, red fish and lake trout, fish in digging ditches and building dunes, passed the house. Minto's bill providing for the registration of Indian war veterans passed, also Gambee's bill for county sealers of weights and measures. Thomas' reapportionment bill failed to pass, 31 to 28.

Raley's Sunday bill provides for the closing of barber shops on Sunday, and will probably become a law. The bills incorporating Brownsville, North Brownsville and Jefferson, have passed both houses.
