

LOCAL RECORD.

GENERAL W. T. SHERMAN.—McPherson Post No. 5, G. A. R., Dept. of Oregon, will meet at their hall in Albany, Saturday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, in commemoration of the many services rendered our country in times of need and during the dark days of the rebellion, by one of the three great Generals of the late war, General William Tecumseh Sherman, whose body on that day will be laid in its final resting place at St. Louis, Mo., by the side of his wife and child. It is hoped every comrade and old soldier will be present, and a cordial invitation is extended to the W. R. C., Sons of Veterans and all citizens who desire to take part in the exercises, which will consist chiefly in song and short reminiscences of the General's life. A meeting for arrangements will be held by the Post and W. R. C. Friday evening at 7 o'clock.

A GOOD THING.—The past has been a very successful year for the Albany Building & Loan Association. The value of the stock, as will be shown by the Secretary's report tomorrow night, has increased over 14 per cent on the amount paid during the year, an interest of 25 1/2 per cent for the time the money has been invested. The increase in the value of the stock paid up for the two years the association has been organized is approximately 27 per cent. A fine showing. Young men, particularly, wishing to invest their money or build homes will find it a fine institution in which to put their money.

TO BE PAID.—One of the items in the appropriation bill is the following: "Pay of D. B. Monteth and H. C. Wood, for rewards under section 2197 of Hill's code, vouchers on file, \$600. The section referred to is one providing for a standing reward of \$300 for the arrest of each person who shall place an obstruction on a railroad track, or misplace a switch. The case for which the appropriation is allowed was that of the wreck at this city by which Engineer Miller and Fireman Guthrie lost their lives.

TAKEN TO THE ASYLUM.—Dr. O'Dell, of Seaside, was brought to Albany today and examined by a commission of two physicians and himself, and committed to the asylum, to which place he was taken this noon by Sheriff Scott. It was at the Doctor's own request that the action was taken. He had again succumbed to his worst enemy, strong drink, and as before sunk beneath the load. Though a bright man, he lacks the will power to resist the great curse of his life. He will be well treated at the asylum, and will soon be out as well as ever.

ACCIDENT ON THE O. P. ROAD.—Tuesday morning as the Oregon Pacific train was rounding the curve between Kings and Lyons station it ran into two hand cars, on which were eight or ten Chinamen with their tools. One of the cars was thrown about thirty feet to one side of the track while the other was badly broken up. Two of the Chinamen were severely cut about the heads and faces. The others escaped with slight bruises.

At the right time Dr. Irvine, on behalf of Mr. Blain's clerks, presented him with a handsome gold headed cane, which was happily responded to, though it was Mr. Blain's first experience in being cased. Such occasions always leave a pleasant spot in one's memory.

PASSED COUNTERFEIT MONEY.

A correspondent in the Salem Journal writing from that city gives an account of how J. M. Madison, who has been figuring some in swindling Albany people, was also a dealer in "green goods."

When he went to Lyons he tried to get W. J. Van Order to go into the business; but Mr. Van, refused, and any way thought he was probably a detective. Then Mr. Madison resigned and Mr. Post was appointed operator there. The following from the Journal will be of particular interest to Albany business men: "Madison was quite friendly to Mr. Post and told him that the company was rotten and he had better resign, and further, he could show him something with much better financial returns, at the same time asking him to look at some greenbacks which he had, some of them were new while others had a worn and greasy look. He told Mr. Post that these would pass anywhere all right, but were spurious. He told him how to take the new bills, place them in coffee, rub the coffee thoroughly on them, and then crumple them up so as to counterfeit long use. Mr. Madison left Mr. Post to think it over while he went to Albany, where he purchased some articles, among them a grip, pair of shoes and a hat. On his return he showed them to Mr. Post, saying that the shoes only cost him 60 cents though the clerk thought he was charging six dollars all right. He said he had passed \$14 of his counterfeit money in one store alone, and again urged Mr. Post to play sickness, as he had done, or to hand in his resignation and go with him to New York, at which place they would embark in the business at little risk and great profit. Some of Mr. Madison's correspondence from Albany is interesting. As an inducement to Mr. Post, to resign, he tells him that the company are going to "fix him, they have heard that he is not a competent operator." From four or five letters which your correspondent read, the tenor is: "We will make things fly." "You're a made man if you accept my proposal." "No danger whatever, as the plates are the true thing and were stolen from the U. S. treasury department." Mr. Madison, as shown by the Wells Fargo books, of this place, sent \$500 cash to the following address: "W. H. Treadwell, 5th Avenue Hotel, New York City, N. Y.," for which he was to receive \$5,000 in green goods. In a private letter, Madison was lamenting the loss of his first consort, who "got mad and left" so that he had to "rustle a new girl" so that his "wife" is merely a decoy also.

STATE LEGISLATURE.

A CLEAR-HEADED VETO.

SALEM, Feb. 19, 11:55 a. m.—The governor vetoed all wagon road appropriations this morning, all that had been presented for his signature.

SALEM, Feb. 18, 1891.

Editor Democrat: Last evening the house railroad bill was defeated in the senate. At the same sitting Veatch's senate bill No. 1 to repeal the railroad commission law, passed, thus wiping out all laws in regard to railroads except the Holt law. Last night a scheme was adopted by some republicans to sardonize the governor, and thereby drive the republicans to their party lines. Today, as a result, house railroad bill giving more power to railroad commissioners, was reconsidered in the senate and passed on a strict party vote. It was a piece of shrewd management worthy of the perpetrators. The new bill is very far from being a just one to the public in all respects.

The wagon road laws that have passed may meet with disaster. Some of the courts will hold, no doubt, that these laws are unconstitutional, and the engineers of the roads may have an opportunity to test them. At the commencement of the legislature, with nice and convincing speeches, it was said that the mine of wealth with which to build these roads, was in the five per cent fund arising from the sales of public lands and which congress has given to the state for the purpose of building wagon roads. Now it turns out that not one of these roads is to be built out of this fund. Those having an eye on this fund for future schemes, may yet be caught in their own trap.

The bill for the sale of the locks is sleeping a deadly sleep. It has not a friend in the house, not one who thinks enough of it to have it resurrected.

The maximum rate freight bill was indefinitely postponed in the senate after the house railroad bill passed.

The school book bill is too modest to make an appearance so far. While it may not blush itself, there are many who blush for it.

The Collins-Minto effort to remove Downing, superintendent of the penitentiary, by law has spent its force and will die in the hands of its sly and cunning nurse.

SALEM, Feb. 18.—In the senate Raley's portage railway bill, after amendment, passed. It provided only for a \$125,000 transfer boat. When it reached the house it failed to pass, 29 to 26. The house concurred in Miller's railroad bill as amended. A joint resolution asked President Harrison to visit Oregon; Hatch's bill for a board of regents for Monmouth school, passed. Dustin's game law bill passed, under it elk cannot be killed for five years. The general appropriation bill appropriates \$1,003,742.53, including only \$3000 for the Albany hospital. A joint resolution was passed providing for publication of 50,000 pamphlets for the World's fair.

Miller's bill giving railroad commission more power was reconsidered and passed the senate, 22 to 7. Veatch's transportation bill was indefinitely postponed. Weatherford's Albany bridge bill passed the house, having already passed the senate; also his smoke stack bill passed the senate.

MISCELL.

Some Pendleton small boys who have devised a new plan of amusement attracted considerable attention last evening. They wrapped themselves in gunny sacks, and thus protected slid down the roof of a house onto a shed and from it tumbled to the ground at the imminent risk of breaking their limbs.—Pendleton E. O.

An Albany young man who had his head felt and received a favorable report on his bumps, the DEMOCRAT is informed is contemplating the establishment of a detective agency, though, it is possible the idea may have been abandoned since he received a valentine, written by a young lady, which he easily detected to be the work of three young men, by a process known only to expert detectives.

R. H. Armstrong, who has lived at Woodburn with his family for the past year or two, was examined at the court house yesterday by Drs. J. W. McFay and W. A. Cusick as to his sanity, which resulted in his being committed to the asylum. His hallucination is that he is the Christ and had made his second advent upon the earth. He also thinks some one is endeavoring to poison him. Armstrong was born in Indiana.—Salem Journal.

Roseburg has made a contract with Chandler & Co. for electric lights. The arrangement is an interesting one, and is about like this: "The company agree to furnish the city with arc lights of 1200 candle power (the Bell system) for \$10 a month each for the first ten years; at the end of that time the matter is to be submitted to arbitration for ten years following, thus giving the company an exclusive franchise for twenty years. The poles for the wires are to be twenty-four feet above the ground and the lights thirty-five feet high, and two poles are to be used at each corner so as to swing the light in the center of the street. The lights are to run all night."

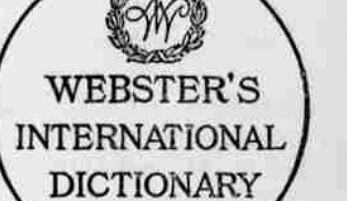
