LOCAL RECORD.

WRITING AUTHORITY.—At least two men have been informed the Democrat that they have been presented with orders signed by their names, for the "Souvenir" heretofore referred to, which they absolutely never signed, nor authorized signed, and of course they refuse to take them. They are men of veracity. Our readers can draw their own conclusions as to what this means. The whole scheme by which the "Souvenir" was gotten up, and like affairs, is a ball-doing one, and a great many who did sign the orders did so against their will, to get rid of being bored. There are meritorious affairs of that kind, occasionally, though, rarely, that deserve support, and the Democrat will never oppose them; but, it will speak against such "Souvenirs" of the Willamette valley, filled with cheap John scenes, many of which it is difficult to tell what they do represent, every time. It is time our business men run their affairs and quit being forced into schemes against their inclinations.

MADISON HEARD FROM.—Several of the creditors of J. M. Madison, the O. P. wharf agent who recently left Albany in a hurry, this morning received postal cards, mailed on the Omaha & Council Bluffs R. R., reading substantially as follows: "Death in our family caused me to leave so suddenly. Please send my bill here and I will pay the same. Signed, J. M. Madison, Aurora, Ill." This is generally thought to be a piece of impudence, and it is doubted if he sent any money it would be more than such as he tried to get the Lyons men to invest in. But the probability is that he does not go to Aurora at all.

UNCONSTITUTIONAL.—Judge Deady gives Boards of County Commissioners a death blow, as follows: In the case of the Pacific Bridge Company vs Clackamas county, the court held that the mention of the "Board of County Commissioners" in section 4141, of the compilation of 1887 relating to the letting of contracts for the building of county bridges, is null and void, because there is no such tribunal known to the constitution or laws of Oregon as a board of county commissioners, and the legislature might as well have said "the Board of Missions."

STATE LEGISLATURE.

SALEM, Feb. 19.—In the house Veatch's railroad commission bill was indefinitely postponed. Several bills, including the Albany bridge bill was read second time. Tongue's bill compelling private citizens to assist public officers in making arrests, passed. Mulkey's bill allowing assessor of Multnomah county salary of \$6000, passed. The general appropriation bill, providing for expenditure of \$1,035,732.53, passed. Miller's omnibus bill, providing for expenditure of \$127,060 from the 5 per cent fund from public lands, passed, 40 to 17.

In the senate the joint resolution inviting President Harrison to visit Oregon, passed. The assessment and taxation bill, over which much valuable time has been spent, failed to pass. The general appropriation bill passed. Veatch voting no, Miller's omnibus bill passed, 16 to 10.

Thirty-three senate bills died in the hands of committee. One senate bill is left on the table. Seven senate bills were indefinitely postponed. Twenty senate bills failed to pass the senate. Total number of senate bills introduced, 227—whole number passed, 126.

SALEM, Feb. 20.—Railroad commissioners nominated by republican caucus are George W. Colvig, Robert Clow and A. N. Hamilton. They will be elected.

Fish commissioners are F. C. Reed, A. C. Campbell and George T. Myers.

Henry Miller's omnibus bill, embracing all the vetoed wagon road bills, providing for building them out of the five per cent fund arising from sale of public lands, passed both houses last night.

SCIO.—W. R. Bilyen and H. H. Hewitt, of Albany, came over from that city Thursday to take part in the Daley-Alexander arbitration.

Mrs T. L. Dugger went to Albany Tuesday, called there by the illness of her daughter-in-law, Mrs G. C. Henderson.

Messrs Morehead and Powell, of the Carbonade coal mining company, went up to the mines Tuesday, for the purpose of putting men at work preparatory to taking out coal.

Mrs A. J. Jannigan, daughter of Mrs Dr King, of this city, of Blodgett, Benton county, arrived in this city Tuesday morning. She was called here on account of her mother's illness.

F. S. Ingram, of near Albany, a cousin of Mr W. H. Ramsey, spent Saturday and Sunday visiting the latter gentleman. On Saturday Mrs Ramsey sent out invitations to the young people of this city, and at 7 p. m., or thereabouts, they assembled and enjoyed the hospitalities of the above mentioned lady.—Press.

Resolutions passed at the mass meeting Saturday night simply thanked the house of representatives for their action in passing the division bill.

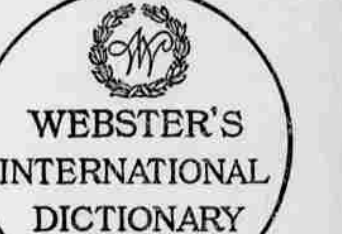
