CITY OFFICIAL PAPER.

LOCAL RECORD.

EUGENE.—Mr E R Silpworth's term of office as clerk of the supreme court expired last Saturday and he has returned to Eugene for permanent residence.

Mr McPherson has completed the school census of district No 4, of Eugene. 11 children of school age he found 54 females and 500 males. He also took the census of the city at the same time and found 1,611 female residents, 1,572 males and 34 Chinamen, total 3,213, an increase of population of about fifty over 1890.

Mr Wheeler has completed the abstract for Eugene precinct and turned the same over to the sheriff. He found 275 unassessed and the sheriff has found 50, making about 325 in all, some of them in the business part of the city. One piece of unassessed farm property was found on which the tax will be \$141.50.

During the last six months eastern advertising has not had the effect it formerly had, tho' the board has had the benefit of a clerical service costing over \$1000 a year."

Last year Salem made a contract with

Lord & Thomas, of Chicago, for advertising in Eastern papers. It was supposed that all was paid but \$160, but Mr Wilson, an agent, was present at a meeting of the board of trade and insisted that \$800 was due. The Journal says that "by his officious manners he assumed that the Salem people did not know how to conduct an ordinary business meeting or enterprise." We clip the following from the Huntsville Herald, published at Huntsville, Randolph county, Missouri:

George has many friends and relatives here, and the editor of this paper has watched his career with a friendly interest from the time that he worked on his father's farm near here, until graduating with high honors at the state university, he threw his shingle as a lawyer and after a brief and acceptably filling the office of city attorney here, chose the distant state of Oregon as his field of labor. THE WILLAMETTE BRIDGE.

A Government Survey Ordered and Committees Appointed.

Steps were taken today which should cause the erection of a bridge at Albany this year.

At 11 o'clock, by appointment made with the county court on its convening at 9 o'clock, the Mayor and committee from the Council, with the citizen's committee, met with the members of the county court. Judge Blackburn was made chairman of the meeting, and C G Burkhardt, secretary. The matter of a bridge over the Willamette at this city was discussed by members of the committee, county judge and commissioners; the council and citizens committees making propositions and concessions, by which, if an appropriation shall be made by the county court at its next term, it can all be paid during 1892, so that so far as the money part is concerned there will be no excuse for delay. The result was the appointment of a committee of Mayor Cowan, from the city government, Wm Rumbough, from the county court, and Dr G W Mason, from the citizen's committee, to attend to a preliminary survey under government engineers for the location of a bridge, and to furnish estimates of the cost.

The bridge will be built this year. The survey will be made at once, arrangements already being made to get the government surveyors here.
