BEST PAVEMENT.—In view of the fact being taken here in the matter of street pavements the report of Wm. H. Phillips, of Burlington, Iowa, as being the Municipal Engineer, will be of value. He compares the merits of the different kind of materials which he had examined, and his conclusions ranged from Toronto, Canada through Iowa and Illinois to Wheeling, West Va. He says he found various materials in use, but the following four the least defective and were the ones which had given general satisfaction from a healthful and economical point. He compares them thus: 1. Merits: durable, clean, healthful; defects: noisy, uncomfortable, slip when worn, and expensive, first cost. 2. Sheet asphaltum—merits: durable, clean, noiseless, healthful; defects: short lived, expensive to repair, very on graded, expensive at first. 3. Bricks—merits: comfortable, durable, healthful, easy to repair; defects: moderately noisy, moderate first cost. 4. Wood blocks—merits: comfortable, noiseless, clean (when new); defects: short lived, moderate first cost. Of these four kinds of paving Mr. Phillips decidedly favors brick to be used in the city of Burlington.
