

DR. IRVINE RESIGNED.—Dr. E. L. Irvine, who has been the second assistant physician in the Oregon state insane asylum since 1887, has tendered his resignation as such and removed to Portland, where he is continuing the practice of his profession. His office will be at the corner of Third and Washington streets. Dr. Irvine is a pleasant gentleman and an able physician and has many friends in Salem. He has been in the city for four years, and has been successful in his chosen profession. His successor has not yet been named. In this connection it might be stated that as per report of the advisory committee a third assistant physician is required, the increasing number of patients making the work too much for the present force. There will, therefore, be two new physicians appointed in an early day, a second and third assistant.—Salem Statesman.

A GOOD IDEA.—A farmer while sitting on his wagon on First Street waiting for goods ordered from an adjoining city was starting at the dormant face of a clock on the Masonic Temple, which had a puzzled look, as a DEMOCRAT approached. Polk county hop grower last fall, when a first came to market, had \$5,000 worth of the redolent berry. He was sold forty-one cents a pound for them to the market was at its highest. By advice of his friends, who expected to go up to 50 or 60 cents, he refused to sell them. As a result he now has 500 pounds of hops for which he can get no market at a figure above 24 cents. This is a loss of 17 cents on the pound, or \$850 on the season's output. This is a very expensive advice.

The Oregon Pacific to Be Sold.
