

LOCAL RECORD.

THE RAILROAD INDICTMENT.

The following is a copy of one of the indictments against E. P. Rogers, the general assistant freight agent of the Southern Pacific R. R. Co. The other indictment has reference to discriminating charges made between Lebanon and Albany and Tangent and Albany. In the Circuit Court of Linn County, State of Oregon, Plaintiff, E. P. ROGERS, Defendant.

E. P. Rogers, accused by the grand jury of the county of Linn, by this indictment, of the crime of charging a greater compensation for carrying freight of the same class for the same direction, committed as follows:

The said E. P. Rogers, on the 18th day of March, 1890, being the assistant general freight agent, and ever since said date and now being the assistant general freight agent of the Southern Pacific company, a corporation engaged in the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise, operating a line of railroad running from the south boundary of the state of Oregon and through the Willamette valley and the city of Albany, in Linn county, Oregon, and the station of Millersburg, in said Linn county, to the city of Portland, in Multnomah county, Oregon, did, on the said 18th day of March, 1890, in the county of Linn and state of Oregon, then and there being the agent, as aforesaid, of said Southern Pacific company, wrongfully, unlawfully and willfully charge and receive and suffer and permit to be charged and received a greater compensation for carrying a similar amount and kind of freight from Millersburg, a distance of 74.9 miles from East Portland, to East Portland, than from said Albany, a distance of 79.4 miles from East Portland, to East Portland, by then and there, on said 18th day of March, 1890, charging and receiving from W. H. Goltra, the sum of 10 cents per one hundred pounds, in car load lots for carrying wheat from said Millersburg to said East Portland over said railroad operated by said Southern Pacific company; whereas on the 16th day of July, 1890, defendant wrongfully charged and received, and suffered to be charged and received from Isom, Lanning & Co., the sum of 7 1/2 cents per hundred pounds, in car load lots, for carrying flour from said Albany to said East Portland over said railroad operated by said Southern Pacific company.

Said wheat and said flour so carried as aforesaid, being property of a similar kind and class, and the rates so charged, as aforesaid, being for car load lots, and the rates so charged, as aforesaid, being the freight rates of said Southern Pacific company, between the points above mentioned, established and in force from the 1st day of January, 1890, to the 1st day of August, 1890. Said crime being committed contrary to the statutes in such cases made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the state of Oregon.

Dated at Albany, in the county aforesaid, the 17th day of March, 1891.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Mr. Wagner, the new proprietor of the big Willamette, alias Chemekete, Hotel, at Salem, complains that the hotel does not pay and that he is losing money. He claims an expense account of \$3000 a month, and thinks he is entitled to the support of Salem people. The outcome is plain. The Statesman is entitled to credit for this important information.

Geo. O. Holman, reading clerk, of the House, was allowed \$10 a day. Total bill \$410. He claimed his services were worth \$15 and refused to take any thing less. Result he will not get even the \$410 for two years the fund being exhausted already. A suit may follow: but Mr. Holman is bound to lose. The case is a peculiar one.

The barbers of Portland, East Portland and Albina have formed a protective union to try and keep the price of shaving up to 15 cents. The constitution and by-laws of the union fixes the wages of the barbers at not less than \$16 per week and 50 cents on the dollar over \$25, or on per centage at the rate of 60 cents on the dollar, all of which will go into effect on and after the 1st of April, 1891.

In illustrating a point in his lecture Rev. Logan told a characteristic story of Lincoln, which though some have heard, is always refreshing. A friend of Lincoln was once gauding him about his long legs. Finally the man said: "Mr. Lincoln, how long do you think a man's legs ought to be, anyway?" "Long enough to reach from his body to the ground," was the quick and convincing answer.

A law passed by the recent state legislature empowers the county court to pay for panthers or cougars not more than \$10 nor less than \$1; for each bear, \$5 to \$1; wild cat or catamount, \$2 to \$1; wolf or coyotes, \$20 to \$1; muskrat, 25 cents to 5 cents; blacktail rabbits, 5 cents to 1 cent; that persons in pursuit, or whose dogs are in pursuit, shall have two-thirds of the bounty if same is killed by another.

In one of the towns on Gray's harbor an ex-judge is cashier of a bank. One day last week he refused to cash a check offered by a stranger. "The check is all right," he said, "but the evidence you offer in identifying yourself as the person to whose order it is drawn is scarcely sufficient."

"I've known you to hang a man on less evidence, judge," was the stranger's response. "Quite likely," replied the ex-judge. "but when it comes to letting go of cold cash, we have to be careful."
