THE MUMMY.—A fair audience listened to Rev. H. V. Rominger's very interesting lecture last evening on Egypt and her monuments. Without any tiresome details the speaker brought his audience right down to the Suez Canal, a little through which is a very uninteresting experience. Then he was at Cairo, a city of Egyptian city, where the boys and girls were everywhere. They caught on to a Yankee at first sight, and immediately solicited patronage for their donkeys by the names of Telephone, Telegraph, General Grant, etc. His description of the great Cheops and the Sphinx were vivid and interesting. The Sphinx is covered with the names of American cranks, who seek that mode of obtaining notoriety. Rev. Rominger went into the tomb among the bats followed by the Egyptians crying "back-ees." His description of the finding of the mummies of the thirty-four kings of Egypt in a cave was a good one. Among the mummies found was the one exhibited. This is a lady mummy, evidently of good blood. She was lying in a position as if she were sleeping, and only her face was exposed, black and uninviting. The coffin in which she was exhibited was the one in which she has lain since the days of the pharaohs. It is made of sycamore wood, and painted in lasting colors, a picture of a lady covering the top, while a feather on the sides indicates that she was of the consequence. The audience were given a close inspection of the woman and small pieces of the aged linen were taken to disappear as relics. This was the third time the mummy had ever been exhibited in the U. S. to an audience, and Albany people were fortunate in being able to see such a well preserved one, and to hear so able an address on the subject.

ANOTHER PAPER R. R.—Articles of incorporation of another railroad were filed with the secretary of state yesterday. It is the Butte Creek & Molalla railroad, with its principal place of business at Butte Creek, Clackamas county. The business is to build and operate railroads and telegraph lines in Marion and Clackamas counties, between Salem and Oregon City. The route lies northeast of Salem, through the Howell prairie to a point near the Oregonian railway at Dow's station or Mount Angel, thence to Butte Creek, Scott's Mills, Willott Springs and Molalla to Oregon City. The capital stock is \$250,000. Incorporators: H. Scott, Robt Thomson, W. G. Miner, R. Riddings, F. W. McLean.

SOLD A BARRACKED MULE.—This noon response to a telegram received from the Marshall Hoffman arrested Thomas borne at the depot. It seems that Thomas is charged with having done a mean thing down at the city where a new one is soon to be erected. It was this, according to the complaint: Thomas bore a neighbor's mule, and sold it very liberally for the sum of \$10; on the 15th day of February a warrant was issued on the discovery of the crime, with the result of the arrest. An officer will be in the city to-night to take Osborne back to Salem, where a year in the pen will probably atone for his offense.

DISSOLVED PARTNERSHIP.—The well-known law firm of Blackburn & Wright, this city, have dissolved partnership. Mr. Blackburn will retain his present offices, while Mr. Wright will, on April 1, open an office in the elegant rooms at the Oregon Bank. The last legislature enacted a law providing that no lawyer can practice in any court presided over by a partner, and as Judge Blackburn is at the head of the county court, his would throw Mr. Wright out of a fine and lucrative probate practice, hence the change. Mr. Wright is building up a fine practice, and will be prepared for his clients in his new offices as he be found in the valley.

THE SURVEY BEGINS.—Mr. Phil and his crew are in the field, and have begun work on the survey for the Willamette river. They will, so far as practicable, use the survey made for the Oregon Pacific and the one made by Mr. Stewart. Building bridges is a business matter and the committee having the matter in charge should proceed in all the details with that end in view, and no doubt will.

The secretary can barely collect enough for his salary, and all heavy subscribers are withdrawn. The local press is critical and unfriendly to the management. A city with as many intelligent and successful business men, and with the vast business interests at stake that Salem has, should not let matters drag thus."
