THE SANTIAM MINES.

Six or Seven Mills to be Put in Soon.

"A new discovery of gold travels with incredible rapidity. The reports of the rich discoveries in the Santiam mining district, is attracting no little attention in Portland, San Francisco, and even in the east," says the Salem Journal.

In referring to the working of the mines several years ago, when the mill was burned and the mines abandoned, the Journal continues:

"After the mines had been worked for a year, the operators turned over to the company about \$1200, as their pay. It has since been discovered that the men working the mines, tunneled into the hill a long distance and then filled up the mouth of the mines. It is also reported they took out about \$75,000 while they operated the mines. From that time little was done until 1889, when a company in this city and one in Albany were organized to make an investigation of that district. Since that time a number of companies have been organized, and a part of them propose to put in machinery early this spring. Preparations to that end are now being made by the following companies: The Red Bull of Salem, Or; the Bonanza, of Albany, Or; the Golden City Co, of Albany, Or; the Galena Co, of Portland, Or; the White Bull, of Salem, Oregon; the Gold Mountain and Dry Gulch Co, (placers) of Salem, Or, and a number of other organized companies have signified their intention to commence active operations in the near future. The properties of the above companies all assay well. The district is large, being not less than thirty miles long and fifteen wide, with plenty of timber and water near at hand. In many of the claims silver seems to predominate, and in going down, as many have, 50 or 75 feet, their ledges seem to be well defined and wide, getting richer in silver every foot, plentifully intermixed with galena. All it requires is capital to develop these mines, and it is destined to become one of the best fields for the investment of money that has ever been discovered on the coast."

An effort will be made to raise \$50,000 for the World's fair by counties. Linn county has been set down for \$9000. We would like to see it raised, but the truth is, the counties won't respond as requested, excepting perhaps Multnomah.

Notwithstanding the fact that Albany is in direct railroad communication with the Santiam mines, and the nearest of the larger cities, the Salem Journal after the fashion of some of its railroad items has the cheek to say: "Salem will necessarily be the center for supplies for that region. The majority of the companies are located in this city, the money is here and the foundry and factories are here, and from that reason alone Salem will be the principal seat of business for that entire district. The East side railroad which runs in a few miles of the city will make a terminus here, and run a branch line to the mines, and also make connections here with Southern Pacific." Like numerous other roads such a road will only be in the air. Ten years from now Salem people will be going to the mines by way of Albany.
